Bare root planting season is this month, which means it's time to think of roses, flowering fruit trees and spring shrubs such as Forsythia, Weigela, Star Magnolia and others. Don't make the mistake of bringing bare-root stock home one weekend, planning to plant it the following week.

Although Torrance schools are not sponsoring the events, they will forward ticket orders to the Los Angeles County superintendent of schools, who is handling arrangements. Mrs. Roosevelt In Tuesday Meet At El Camino

U.S. ambassador of goodwill, writer and speaker, Mrs. Franklin Delano Roosevelt will address students and friends of El Camino College at 8:30 p.m., Tuesday in the college gymnasium.

Mrs. Roosevelt's lecture will be entitled, "Is America Facing World Leadership?"

Tickets for Mrs. Roosevelt's speech are available in the El Camino College student store. The public may purchase general admission tickets for one dollar whereas students and employees of El Camino may obtain tickets for 50c by displaying their activity books.

Her travels and her work with the United Nations have left Mrs. Roosevelt with an attitude toward foreign relations that combines an almost hard-boiled realism with a profound faith that "Americans can do what has to be done if only we know what it is."

She wants Americans to "forget some of their fears and to take a fresh look at the real world."

Appointed chairman of the Commission on Human Rights of the U.N. in 1945, Mrs. Roosevelt embarked on her "most important task," the drawing up of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

For three years she mediated between the Russians and the Moslems, between the Canadians and the Chinese, between the Indians and the English, using all her tact and good will in the attempt to produce a meaningful document on the civil, political, economic and social rights of mankind.

One way was making friends. She always made a point of spending her free social time with delegates from other countries in order to better understand their points of view.

The declaration was accepted by the U.N. General Assembly on December 10, 1948.

MOST INFORMATIVE

In September, 1957, her "most important, most interesting and most informative" trip to the Soviet Union took place. There she conversed with Premier Khrushchev for two-and-a-half hours. Khrushchev returned the call during his history-making American trip in 1959.

Mrs. Roosevelt works hard for her favorite "causes," particularly the American Association for the United Nations and the Democratic Party. She is a member of the Democratic Advisory Council and worked hard for Adlai E. Stevenson in 1956.

As a citizen and voter, she concerns herself actively with her community of Hyde Park, N.Y.

When she discovered she had missed, during the summer a town meeting that defeated the school budget, she was quite disturbed and went to work to inform herself on all aspects of the local controversy.

After three score and fifteen years, Eleanor Roosevelt is still learning.
