

California Bank Opens New Office In El Segundo

California Bank's El Segundo office will open its new, permanent quarters, next Monday, announced Frank L. King, chairman of the board. The new building, at 740 North Sepulveda Boulevard, will replace the temporary Banking facility, now located in a large trailer-bank adjacent to the new office.

On opening day, the bank will open its doors at 10 a.m. and remain open until 6 p.m. to permit visits by customers, residents, and businessmen in the area. Normal banking hours will continue to be from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. daily, and from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Friday evenings.

Robert A. Denzel, assistant vice president and manager of the El Segundo office, stated the new building, banking fixtures, equipment, and land purchase represents an investment of \$340,000 in the community of El Segundo. Completely airconditioned, the permanent building contains more than 7,200 square feet. The masonry building, designed by Victor Gruen Associates, has a large, glass curtain wall extending from the front of the bank, back to the drive-up teller window on the north side. A metal entrance canopy offers architectural interest at the Sepulveda Boulevard entrance of the new bank. The L. E. Dixon Company, general contractors, were in charge of construction for the new bank office.

EASY ACCESS

Easy access to the centrally located office is available from either the north bound lanes of Sepulveda Boulevard or from the Maple Avenue entrance. Ample customer parking, for more than fifty cars, is provided at the north side of the bank, convenient to the bank's side and front entrances. A night depository is available to the bank's customers and for the convenience of the merchants and businessmen in the area. Within the main banking lobby, a customer lounge area is provided for the comfort of customers. Complete banking services will be offered at this modern, new office of California Bank. Flexible teller line, a new banking innovation, offers the services of ten tellers to handle normal bank checking, savings, and note activities. A colored terrazzo floor blends with the colorful decor of the building interior, the same color and design theme carried into the 1,600 square foot subterranean area, which will contain employee staff rooms, and building service areas.

VETERAN

A veteran banker, Robert Wenzel began his banking career in 1928. He has previously served as manager of the Crenshaw and 147th Street office in Gardena, and the Bell office. He was appointed an assistant manager in 1944 and manager three years later. Wenzel was named an assistant vice president of California Bank in 1956. Prior to joining the bank, he was associated with the Los Angeles office of the Federal Reserve Bank.

Born in Portland, Oregon, Wenzel attended Southwestern University and is a graduate of the Pacific Coast School of Banking. He is a member and active in many business, civic, and professional organizations in the South Bay area.

Crunch Apple Pie

Streusel topping and crisp toasted almonds add a special flourish to an apple pie. This "Almond Crunch Apple Pie" is a delicious dessert. Serve it warm or cold, plain or with a topping of whipped cream or ice cream.

To make an "Almond Crunch Apple Pie," combine 1/3 cup brown sugar (packed), 1/3 cup granulated sugar, 2/3 cup fine graham cracker crumbs, 1/3 cup sifted all-purpose flour, 1/3 cup soft butter or margarine and 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon. Mix until crumbly. Pare, core and slice 5 medium-size cooking apples. Arrange in pastry-lined 9-inch pie pan. Cover apples with sugar-butter mixture. Bake on lowest rack of hot oven (400 degrees F.) 30 minutes. Sprinkle top with 1/2 cup silvered blanched almonds and bake 10 minutes longer, or until apples are tender. Serve warm or cold, topped with whipped cream or ice cream, if desired. Makes 1 (9-inch) pie.

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


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
