### Increase Noted In Patients at So. Bay Hospital

South Bay Hospital had an average of 19 more patients per day during the month of November than it did during the month of October, directors of South Bay Hospital District heard Wednesday night from Russell B. Williams, hospital administrator.

The "average daily census" of 55.2 is the highest the hospital has had in its first four months of operation. Williams said the November increase in activity is the sharpest increase experienced at the 150-bed medical facility in a single month.

Prior to November, the hospital activity chart had shown a steady increase from an average daily census of 35 patients in August, the first month of operation, to 40 and 45 in following months, Williams explained.

**GAINS CONFIDENCE**  
He had the increase in activity appears to be evidence that the facility is gaining the confidence of South Bay residents and taxpayers who voted to create the hospital district, and later the hospital at N. Prospect Ave. and Diamond St., Redondo Beach. Williams told Board members he anticipated a slight decrease in activity during December, due to the fact that many patients who plan to undergo surgery, but are not required to do so immediately, will wait until after the holiday season.

Other statistics showed the hospital had a total of 831 admissions during the month, compared to 276 in October. Sixty-one babies were born during the period, compared to 43 in October.

Emergency center treatments decreased from 242 in October to 221 in November.
