Supervisors Approve San Diego Freeway Linkage for Torrance-South Bay Area

A routine item on last week's agenda of the County Board of Supervisors spelled out final victory to the long, hard campaign carried on for many years by civic leaders and public officials of the Southwest and South Bay areas to expedite construction of the San Diego freeway between Jefferson boulevard and the Harbor freeway.

The routine item called for the Board of Supervisors to give final agreement for the future of the intersection of 135th street and Anza avenue, which is in the path of the San Diego freeway.

Supervisors pointed out agreements involving street closings along the route of the San Diego freeway had been previously approved by the County. However, no agreement involving the 135th and Anza intersection had been approved because the area had been under annexation proceeding, which have now been dropped.

WAY CLEARED
Supervisors emphasized that with approval of the agreement the way has been cleared for construction of the San Diego freeway through the vicinity of the Los Angeles International Airport, Culver City, Inglewood, Lennox, the Baldwin Hills, Hawthorne, Lawndale and Torrance.

"This area, particularly near the airport, suffers from one of the most severe traffic problems in Southern California."

Construction of the freeway will relieve this problem by taking many cars off the surface roads such as Century boulevard, Imperial highway, Rosecrans avenue, Sepulveda boulevard, Aviation boulevard, Inglewood avenue, Hawthorne avenue and many residential streets," Supervisor Kenneth Hahn reported.

"MISSING LINK"
Funds to build the "missing link" of the San Diego freeway between Jefferson boulevard and Artesia boulevard (174th street) have been assured as the State Highway Commission last October appropriated \$24,000,000 to the project.

This action followed a strong, united presentation outlining the urgency of the project by a large delegation of Southwest and South Bay civic leaders and public officials before the Commission in Sacramento last August.

PRESENT RESOLUTION
Supervisor Hahn accompanied the group and presented a strongly worded resolution, co-authored by Supervisor Burton Chace, from the County Board of Supervisors urging allocation of funds for construction. He also conferred personally with Governor Edmund G. Brown, and urged him to assume leadership in making certain that funds would be made available.

The agreement approved by the Board of Supervisors

for the future of the intersection of 135th and Anza provides that 135th street will be kept open by construction of an overpass at the intersection. Anza avenue will be narrowed slightly at this location and will revert to the status of a frontage road between Rosecrans avenue and El Segundo boulevard when the freeway is built.

Business Index Shows Firm Stand For Southland, Says Area Banker

Southern California's business activity continued firm during November, dropping less than 1/10 of one per cent below the October level. James J. Weigel manager of Security First National Bank's Torrance Branch reported this week.

Bank's index of business activity stood at 215.8 and registered a 4.3 per cent increase above the November, 1959 level.

Of the 14 seasonally adjusted components of the business index, Weigel noted, declines were most evident among those series reflecting the consumer and private investment sectors of the local economy; i.e., bank deposits, department store sales, real estate transfers, and the valuation of building permits.

Offset by Gains
These declines were offset by gains in engineering construction, factory employment, and the sales of electric power to industry.

Between October and November, unemployment in the southern half of California increased more than the usual seasonal amount. On a seasonally adjusted basis, unemployment increased for the 11th consecutive month.

Compared with a year earlier, the number reported unemployed was up 37 per cent.

On the other hand, employment remained virtually unchanged between October and November. The moderate gains which were registered in the Los Angeles-Long Beach and San Diego areas, were offset by declines in the San Bernardino-Riverside, Fresno and Bakersfield areas.
