EC Wrestling Tourney Top Sports Attraction

El Camino College's seventh annual High School Invitational Wrestling Tournament will commence Saturday, Jan. 21, at 10 a.m. in the women's gym.

Competition is expected to be the keenest in the last seven years of high school wrestling, as top teams in the North and South Bay, Centinela Valley and Torrance areas have been invited.

In the six-year history of the EC Tourney, Mira Costa High was champion three times. Redondo and Morningside High each grabbed the title once and shared the championship once.

Indications point to a sell-out crowd and fans are advised to arrive early to insure seats. Prices for admission to the tournament are 50 cents for any one of the three sessions or \$1 for all three. The sessions are broken down into preliminary matches (10 a.m.-1 p.m.); semi-finals (2-5 p.m.); and championships (7:30 p.m. to conclusion).

16 TEAMS INVITED

The 16 teams invited to the Warrior High school tournament are Aviation, Beverly Hills, Culver City, El Segundo, Hawthorne, Inglewood, Lawndale, Lennox, Leuzinger, Mira Costa, Morningside, North Torrance, Redondo, Santa Monica, South Torrance and Torrance.

Gilbert Gerago of Torrance was third in the EC tourney last year, and has lost only once in the 106-pound division this year. The 115-pound division shapes up as one of the toughest competitive classes with Torrance's Earl Yanase, defending EC tourney cham, and North's Mike Hanchett losing only one match each. Hanchett was third in the EC tourney last year in the 115-pound class.

North's Felix Evillar is considered very strong and a darkhorse in the 123-pound class. And at 130, North's Bob Marlietta is undefeated.

SOUTH HEAVY TOPS

Don Dalbrick of Torrance is a high choice in the 141-pound division with Mike Irvine of Torrance, a runner-up last year in the 168-pound class, a good bet for that weight.

South's Dave Birmingham, undefeated heavyweight, has pinned all opponents and his top foe should be Dennis Smith of Redondo, who was Bay League champ and runner-up in the EC Tourney last year.

White Cup In View for El Camino

Currently initiating basketball and wrestling seasons and looking forward to an action-packed spring athletic schedule, El Camino College shares the Metropolitan Conference in leadership with Long Beach in the race for the Carl White Memorial Trophy.

Sporting an all-time seasonal high in point-scoring, the Warriors have come within grasp of the coveted award on the basis of their performance in cross country, water polo and football.

EC HAS 22
The award is presented on the basis of college performance in all sports throughout the year. Still on the spring athletic horizon are track, baseball, gymnastics, tennis, swimming and golf.

In achieving the largest point total which it has netted during the fall season, El Camino sports 22 points after nabbing first place in cross country, second in water polo and fourth in football.

Points are issued on the basis of final standings in conference play. Ten points are allotted for first place, eight for second, six for third, four for fourth, two for fifth, one for sixth, an none or seventh and eighth place performances.

HARBOR LAST
Long Beach scored 10 points for each conference title, with championships in both football and water polo to its credit and gained an additional two points in cross country.

Bakersfield is in third spot with 19 1/2 points, followed by Santa Monica in fourth with 14 1/2.

Scoring in second division follows: Valley, 8 1/2, San Diego, 3 and East LA 2 1/2, with Harbor yet to score in the race for the Ironman Trophy.


