Local Assemblyman Is Co-Author Of Stricter Anti-Narcotics Law

Assemblyman Vincent Thomas of San Pedro is co-author of two bills which would drastically tighten California's narcotics laws.

Both AB numbers one and nine would generally increase penalties for possession of narcotics, including marijuana.

In addition to various increases in the term imprisonment, the bills would eliminate alternative of county jail sentence in many cases. Other provisions:

1—Prohibits release on parole or any other release from prison for stated periods, usually coinciding with the minimum term for the particular offense.

2—Provides additional schedule of penalties for persons convicted previously two or more times of narcotics offenses, more severe than in cases where the offender has only one prior conviction.

3—Permits a fine up to \$20,000 for each such offense, in addition to a prison term.

The bills would increase the average narcotics term of one to five years up to two to

twenty years, and would deny probation in cases of offenses against minors. Other sentences range up to ten years to life.

Assemblyman Thomas said he planned to "work vigorously for enactment of tighter laws against narcotics offenders—particularly second offenders."

School Facilities Used by Many Outside Groups, Says Board Study

Torrance school facilities were used more than 1100 times by various non-school groups during the last three months of 1960, according to a recent report to the Board of Education. This is an average of about 13 times per day for the period.

Leading user of school facilities was the Torrance Recreation Department, which had 366 permits. Other users include Girl Scouts, Campfire Girls, and Brownies, 321 permits; Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts, 114; YMCA, 90; PTA, 43; Little Leagues, 46; university extension courses, 40.

Other miscellaneous uses were by youth groups, barbershop quartets, the Red Cross; homeowners' groups, Community Chest, postal

workers, March of Dimes, and various other civic groups. The Civic Center Act provides that schools may be used by various civic organizations outside of the times when they are needed for actual instruction.
