Announce Formation of Torrance Youth Symphony

A youth symphony, composed of students of elementary school age, will be organized for Torrance and the South Bay area, according to an announcement by the Torrance Area Youth Bands.

Youth band organization has decided to recruit and sponsor a youth orchestra for the purpose of providing the training and development of talented string players who have few opportunities to further their skills outside of school hours.

James Van Dyck, director of the youth bands, stated that there is a serious shortage of skilled string players, not only in the local area but nationwide. "Someone has to do something to 'save' symphony orchestras," he said.

String sections, composed of violins, violas, cellos, and string basses, will be organized first, with weekly rehearsals beginning around March 1. Wind and percussion players from the Junior Youth Band will be added after the string section has become balanced.

Supervisor Opposes State Move For Increase in California Gas Tax

Supervisor Kenneth Hahn declared Tuesday that he would not support an increase in the State gas tax by one cent a gallon or a 50 percent increase in the "in lieu" tax which is included in the price motorists pay for their license tags.

"At the present time, Los Angeles County motorists pay 10 cents in State and Federal Taxes on each gallon of gas they buy. The State gas tax is six cents. Los Angeles County motorists pay more than their share of state gas taxes and do not get a fair share of the money back to be used in improved streets and highways in Los Angeles County," Supervisor Hahn declared.

He added that he believes that gas taxes have reached a maximum ceiling and should not be increased.

UNTHINKABLE—With all the other taxes that the people of California are paying, and increase in the gas tax is unthinkable," Supervisor Hahn stated.

The County Supervisors Association of California has requested the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors to support its program calling

for a gas tax increase. Supervisor Hahn said that he would not support an increase in the State gas tax under any circumstance.

Instead of increasing the gas taxes paid to the State and Federal governments, the public should demand that maximum value is received for each gas tax dollar collected and that none of the money paid by the motorists for road improvements is diverted for administration, impressive buildings, or for any purpose other than building and improving streets and highways, Supervisor Hahn declared.

Total Revenues Up At Torrance Aluminum Plant

Sales and earnings for Harvey Aluminum (Incorporated) rose for the first quarter of the current year, Lawrence A. Harvey, board chairman, reported this week.

Increased production facilities, new marketing outlets, and a broader range of products produced enabled the company to build its sales and profits, Harvey said.

For the first three months ending December 31, the aluminum producer reported sales of \$18,643,233, with a net income of \$1,189,879, equal to 25 cents a share. For the like period the previous year, net income was \$971,401 or 20 cents a share on sales of \$14,699,846, based on 4,750,000 shares outstanding. The company has had public stockholders only since June 20, 1960.

The outlook for the remainder of the fiscal year appears promising, he added.
