ORGANIZED
Seaside Community church was organized in 1954 as a result of the cooperation of the comity committee of the So. California Council of Churches and the Board of National Missions of the Evangelical and Reformed Church.

The Rev. Richard A. Miller was called to be the organizing pastor of this new congregation in West Torrance. The first service was held on February 21, 1954 at the parsonage, 5342 Sharynne Lane, with 21 persons present.

From the very beginning, the mobile population of booming West Torrance has effected the ministry of Seaside Church. DORMANT SPRAY

Construction of New Temple Menorah to Begin Immediately

Construction of the new Temple Menorah of the South Bay will begin immediately, according to George Lewison, president of the Congregation.

"The plans for this structure have already won a national architect's award for our designer, Kenneth N. Lind, AIA," Lewison said, and this building will be one of the most impressive and gracious of all the religious buildings in this area."

Located on the Redondo Beach-Torrance borderline on Sepulveda Blvd. and Knob Hill St., the new Temple Menorah will serve Jews in the Peninsula area as well as those in Torrance and the Beach cities. The Congregation already numbers almost three hundred families in its membership, with a progressive religious school of that same number of students. A Sisterhood, Men's Club, two Youth Groups, and a Senior Sisterhood and Young Married's Club comprise the affiliated organizations. The Temple is a member of the Union of American Hebrew

Congregations, whose headquarters is in the House of Living Judaism, 838 Fifth Ave., New York City.

Rabbi Henri E. Front is the Spiritual Leader of Temple Menorah, coming to the Congregation following an overseas tour of duty with the Marine Corps. A graduate of the Hebrew Union College, the world's oldest rabbinical seminary, located in Cincinnati, he is presently on the Faculty of its Los Angeles school, and has just been elected President of the South Bay Ministerial Association. He also is a National Chaplain of the Jewish War Veterans of the United States.

The Temple will undertake construction in time to honor its fourteenth anniversary, having been started on January 24, 1947 by Anna and the late Isaac H. Grancell, with fifteen other Jewish families from Hermosa and Redondo Beach. The present Temple is located in a building at 112 N. Catalina Ave., Redondo Beach, which was made available to them by the
