Polio Clinic Set Wednesday

The Junior Woman's Club of Wilmington will hold a polio-tetanus clinic Wednesday evening, Feb. 22, from 6:30 to 9:30 o'clock at the Wilmington Woman's Clubhouse at Lakme and Denni, Wilmington.

During the peak polio season the Juniors held several polio clinics. Wednesday's clinic is planned to provide a third shot for those who received their first and second shots before July 22, 1960. A third polio shot may be received 12 months from time of the second shot.

If a person has gone over this time, it is advisable to begin the series again. The Juniors have scheduled additional clinics for March 22 and April 19.

Tetanus shots also will be available at the clinic Wednesday night. Procedure for tetanus shots is the second shot four weeks from the first and a third shot one year after the second shot.

The clinic will be staffed by doctors from the Wilmington Community Hospital, assisted by members of the Junior and Senior Woman's Clubs. There will be a donation of \$1 for each shot. Proceeds from the polio shots will go to the Community Hospital. Money from the tetanus shots will go to the John Tracy Clinic, the Los Cerritos Junior District philanthropy.

Minors not accompanied by parents Wednesday evening should bring written permission for shots.

Heart Specialist Tells of Research At Harbor General

Research work is now being done for the cure and prevention of heart diseases in the various hospitals and clinics throughout the land and the Harbor General Hospital is no exception.

Dr. Steve C. K. Liu, resident heart specialist, made these remarks at an interview recently. Dr. Liu is the cardiopulmonary clinic director and also the chief cardiologists of the Harbor General Hospital.

BASIC PROJECTS

There are four basic projects under way at the present time with the number one project being almost complete. The study of the elastic properties of the human heart and especially the left aurium of the normal heart and also in the heart of patients afflicted with rheumatoid heart disease.

The study of the control of blood in the lungs and the effects on the heart.

Protection of blood supply into the heart of persons with or without coronary heart disease.

Disolve blood clots in the blood vessels by the use of chemicals.

There are many other projects of this nature that they expect to get under way in the very near future.

LABORATORY

A much larger research laboratory will be included in the new million dollar hospital that is now under construction at this same location and the staff of heart specialists expects to be located in this building within the next year.

Dr. Liu has been studying the diseases of the heart for the past ten years and has been with the Harbor General for these 10 years.

The Los Angeles County Heart Association is now conducting the Annual Heart Fund Drive during the month of February with the door to door campaign to take place during the week of February 23 through the 26.
