Flavian Shopping Center Aids Students' Studies

"Flavian Shopping Center" is helping first, second and third graders at Flavian Elementary School, Torrance to learn their reading, writing, arithmetic, and other subjects.

Students have built their own small shopping centers, with four "shops"—a grocery store, post office, bank, and library—as part of their studies of the community in which they live. Youngsters get a chance to make practical applications of the studies they pursue in class.

Youngsters designed and built the small center which they now patronize eagerly. With class checks, they can get money out of the bank and they use this to buy groceries and other items at their market. Market is stock-

ed with cans and boxes the youngsters have brought from home, as well as papier mache vegetable and fruits.

LIBRARY STOCKED
Flavian library is stocked with a number of books that their teacher checked out from the "supermarket of knowledge," the Educational Materials building. Youngsters go through the regular routine to get books in which they are interested.

Post office was set up after a class visit to the Torrance Post Office. Each youngster has a box and the youngsters are eager to practice writing letters, so they can mail them. All notices to be sent home are put in the youngsters' boxes.

School savings are handled through the bank, as well as the paper money with which students budget their various purchases.
