El Camino will go into the game off a weekend trip from UC at Santa Barbara, where the Warriors are scheduled for two practice games.

USC finished second, behind Minnesota, in the nation last year and Coach Rod Dedaux boasts a stronger squad for the '61 season.

Coach Dedaux has been noted for producing outstanding baseball talent. Both Ron Fairly and Carl Warwick, outfielders of the Dodgers, are among his recent products.

ECC also sports one of its strongest all-time clubs with talent at every starting post. With nine pitchers, the War-

riors will have enough manpower to ensure depth throughout the season.

Coach Freeman was a member of the 1948 NCAA baseball champions when he attended SC under the guidance of Dedaux.

## Globetrotters' Match in Arena Slated April 15

The Los Angeles game of the World Series of Basketball, featuring the Harlem Globetrotters against the 1961 College All-Americans, will be played at the Memorial Sports Arena Saturday night, April 15.

Announcement was made by Abe Saperstein, originator of the famed coast-to-coast tour, who is resuming the series after a two-year lapse.

The Pan American Games of 1959 and the Olympic Games of 1960 impelled Saperstein to forego the tour, thus leaving the finest collegiate players available for national teams. Victories for Uncle Sam in both international tournaments was ample reward.

The 1961 series will be the tenth, and the Trotters, who leave their zany antics in the dressing room against the All-Americans, have been victors in all nine previous tours. The prize clown of the Trotters, Meadowlark Lemon, is a player of tremendous talent as well.

Los Angeles holds the attendance record for the series. An outdoor game in the Coliseum in 1953 attracted 36,256 fans on a chilly night, while 31,648 turned out at the Rose Bowl in 1951 despite inclement weather.

Many of the NBA's greatest stars made their pro debuts against the Trotters, including Bill Sharman, Bob

Cousy, Paul Arizin, Tom Heinsohn, Cliff Hagan and Bob Leonard, to name a few. Needless to say, the 1961 series figures to produce stars of similar stature.

Only seniors, who have finished their collegiate careers, are eligible for the All-American teams, which will be announced shortly.

LET'S GO BOWLING With Darlene Cope

The Thursday afternoon spare pick-up class at Gable House dealt with how a bowler should line himself up to convert a particular spare.

CROSS ALLEY Jerry Homel explained the three major positions for picking up the main points on the lane. Number one was to stand on the extreme right dot, throw over the second arrow and you should convert the 7 pin; number two was to stand on the extreme left dot, aim at the third arrow and the ball should hit the 10 pin; the third factor was to shoot for the 5 pin or stand near the middle of the approach and aim for the second arrow.

These are general rules and are for most bowlers who throw a straight ball or one which hooks a little. Homel further explained why the proper release of the ball is so important. The wrist should not be broken but should remain straight. If the ball is released properly, the thumb will come out first, the fingers will then follow, giving just enough lift on the ball, providing you follow through correctly.

The question was asked whether or not a bowler could line up directly with a pin and shoot for it straight down the lane. Homel demonstrated the point in question and concluded that if the ball was thrown properly, it would hook away. For example, shooting straight down the right side for a 10 pin would not normally succeed. Homel stated that cross alley is a better way for converting end pins.

These advanced classes over the past four or five months are really proving to be worthwhile. The class for beginners will commence in three weeks, so lots of instruction is available at Gable House.

## California Ranks Third in Banking Centers in Nation

Security First National Bank's research department last week reported that the state of California has the third and fifth largest banking centers in the nation.

According to the report, the Los Angeles-Long Beach metropolitan area is the leading center in the state. As of June 15, 1960, the area had bank deposits totaling \$9,130,527,000, an increase of 10 per cent from the mid-1958 deposit total of \$8,287,081,000.

The 1960 figure is exceeded only by the New York area, which ranks first with \$51,829,321,000, and second-place Chicago with \$12,597,781,600.

The San Francisco-Oakland area is in fifth position, the bank said, having been passed by the Philadelphia area between mid-1958 and mid-1960.

## Taxpayers Warned by Revenue Service

U. S. Internal Revenue Service today cautioned taxpayers not to rely on published tables reflecting the average amounts claimed by taxpayers as deductions for contributions, interest, taxes, medical expenses and other deductible items.

IRS said its district offices had recently issued tables reflecting amounts which may be used by taxpayers as a guide in claiming deduction for State and local sales taxes, but that no authorization has been given for the use of tables or averages as guides for any of the other deductible items.

IRS said it had authorized issuance of the sales tax tables because of the relatively small amounts involved, and the difficulty encountered by taxpayers in attempting to keep a detailed record of sales taxes actually paid during the year.

IRS said neither of these factors is normally present with regard to other deductible items. Consequently, taxpayers should list only amounts actually paid for other items and they should be prepared to substantiate amounts claimed upon audit of their returns by receipts, cancelled checks, an other documentary evidence.

## El Camino Hosts Jaycee Wrestling Championships

Grappling greats from all sectors of California congregated at El Camino College this weekend to determine the State Junior College championships for 1961.

Favored to nab the tourney are the defending champs from San Bernardino Valley College, with entries from Fresno City and Modesto colleges slated as strong threats. El Camino is rated as having an outside chance, having completed its regular season with 3 wins against three losses.

Some 20 colleges and 125 wrestlers are expected to participate in the championship tourney, which opened Friday in the El Camino Gymnasium. Quarter finals followed with Saturday's events featuring the semi-finals at 1 p.m. and the championship competition at 7 p.m.

REGISTRATIONS In addition to the San Bernardino, Fresno, Modesto and El Camino teams, registration applications were received from Bakersfield College, College of Sequoias, Orange Coast College, Riverside City College, Los Angeles City College, Chaffee College, Mt. San Antonio College, Cerritos College and Cabrillo College.

El Camino last swept the state championships in 1956 and 1957; since that time the Hengstler - coached squads have always finished fifth or better in state competition. The Warriors placed fourth last year, behind San Bernardino, Fresno and Modesto, in that order.

Top threats on the host squad are Frank Dolce, 177 pounds; Dave Fiorelli, 147; Bob Becker, 147; John Arnold, 130 and Jim Watanabe, 115. Sam Maus, 191, and Alex Munson, heavyweight, will also prove potential threats for the Warriors.
