Aerospace Report

Keeping track of a sky full of "birds"—whether friendly or enemy—poses one of the most complex problems in modern radar electronics. Control centers must know where each aircraft is at all times, whatever the weather.

This means its direction, its distance, and its altitude in relation to all other "birds" in the sky. And they must know instantly, for seconds are miles at modern speeds.

Instruments have been developed that can accomplish this difficult task and these instruments are currently in use by the U.S. Air Force.

Provisional training is being provided qualified airmen to operate and maintain our radar and tracking equipment. One of the basic courses taught in this field of radar detection is conducted at Keesler AFB, Mississippi.

where in 27 weeks the new member of the Aero-space team receives instruction in aircraft characteristics, basic weather theory, navigational aids and equipment and ground control approach operation.

Courses vary in length from a few weeks to approximately one year. In the more advanced technical jobs the airman must often complete two or more courses, fundamental and advanced, to qualify for actual duty assignment. It is a step-by-step procedure in which the individual builds towards a worthwhile career.

Classifications of persons enlisting in the U.S. Air Force is accomplished prior to enlistment. Applicants must complete and achieve qualifying scores on the Airman Qualifying Examination which is administered soon after initial contact with your friendly Air Force Recruiter. After the test results have been evaluated the individual is counseled regarding his or her abilities in the various areas. The Air Force takes definite planned steps to place the "right man or woman in the right job."

These aptitude tests are given Wednesdays and Fridays of each week. Persons interested in taking them can do so by contacting your local Air Force Recruiting Office at 1319 1/2 Sartori St., Torrance.
