Leading the cast of 39 will be Mary Kirshmann, portraying Curly, and Neal Robbins co-starring as Laurey. Understudying as dancers for the lead characters will be Leslie Bazis as Curly, Mary Ann Schmidt as Laurey and Daryl Gilman, taking over as Jud Fry during the dance scenes. Phil DiGiulia will portray Jud Fry in drama scenes.

DIRECTION
Under the direction of Burnett Ferguson, theater-arts instructor the thespians will stage the Broadway musical hit as the final spring semester production.

Other members of the cast will be Mary Lynn Phillips as Aunt Eller, Dennis Robbins playing Ike Skidmore, Bill Doty as Fred, Lee Reavis as Slim, Eric Morgan portraying Wils Parker, Jeanette Kozlowski as Ado Annie

DANCE CAST
A cast of 12 dancers and 17 singers will accompany the drama cast. A mixture of ballet, interpretative and western dances will be performed by the group. Choreography is being staged by June Tsukida, modern dance instructor.

Sets for the annual musical are under construction by stage production crews headed by Les Thomas, stage craft instructor. Costumes are being designed by Ross Corbin.

Tickets for the May production are now on sale in the student store. Admission will be \$1.25 for the general public. All seats are reserved.

El Camino Teacher Will Appear as Guest Pianist

June Lusk, concert pianist and member of the music faculty of El Camino College, will perform as guest soloist with the Inglewood Symphony Orchestra, Saturday, April 22, in the Campus Center.

Program for Miss Lusk's performance will be the Mozart "Coronation" Concerto; the Puccini Suite by Stravinsky and the world premiere of W. Grant Still's "Patterns," which is dedicated to Ernest Gebert and the Inglewood Symphony.

Both the Inglewood Symphony, which is in its twelfth season, and Miss Lusk, who with this performance presents to El Camino audiences her fifth annual spring piano recital, have received critical recognition in the musical world.

SCHOLARSHIP
In 1954-55, Miss Lusk was

awarded a Fulbright scholarship to attend the Conservatory of Music in Cologne. Prior to this she had completed work for her Master's degree at the University of Southern California.

The Inglewood Symphony, under the direction of founder Ernest Gebert, has been described by Newsweek magazine as "Inglewood's greatest cultural asset." The Orchestra also has had the distinction of being heard by national audiences over the NBC radio network.

Educational Committee Visits District; Tours Torrance High as Part of Program

A five-man committee from the California Association of Secondary School Administrators visited Torrance High School last week in the final step in a year-long self-evaluation program.

The committee, headed by Dr. Willard H. Van Dyke, Long Beach State, was invited by the Board of Education last year as part of a new evaluation-accreditation program in California Schools. The program involves intensive study of a high school by its administrators and

teachers and preparation of a report on their observations. Then, the committee visits the school, studies the faculty report and makes its own evaluation of the situation. The committee compiles its findings of commendations and recommendations into a report sent both to the local district and to the C.A.S.S.A. School Accreditation Committee.

ACCREDITATIONS
Based on the report, the C.A.S.S.A. may give a school accreditation for periods up to five years. Accreditation means that the school meets standards of performance set up by the C.A.S.S.A.

Beside Dr. Van Dyke, other members of the visiting committee were Superintendent J. W. Crosby, Oxnard; Harry Smallenberg, director of research and guidance, L.A. County Schools, Principal George V. Burnett, El Monte High School; and Toren Wain, State Department of Education.

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
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
