Each unwanted player, and they were all that, were placed on a draft list, to be sold for \$75,000 a piece. The Angels picked 28 for a net outlay of \$2,100,000.

Among the pitchers chosen to wear Angels numerals were New York Yankee cast-offs Eli Grba and Duke Maas. The pair won 11 and lost 5, mostly in relief.




