

ETI Registration Set For Summer Sessions

Electronic Technical Institute is registering students now for classes starting May 15, to help meet the needs of the Electronics Industry.

Howard S. Ashe, president of the Electronic Technical Institute, states that the objectives are two fold: To prepare individuals for employment in the Electronics Industry by providing sound training in Mathematics, Electronics theory and practice and to prepare technical personnel for advancement in their present jobs.

For persons not having the necessary background in Mathematics, a special course is offered which will prepare the student for the regular Electronics training program.

Ashe also said that challenging careers are open to persons who are technically qualified to take advantage of the increasing opportunities in the Electronics, Nuclear and Space Programs. He said that 90 per cent of the students work full time in industry and carry a full schedule at ETI. Many of the students are already employed in the Electronics Industry.

The importance of this training is recognized by Electronics Companies who participate in the program by re-

imbursing employee-students as much as 50 per cent for training received at ETI.

Electronic Technical Institute is a non-profit organization owned and endowed by the Sherry Griswold Foundation. The Foundation maintains resident campuses in Inglewood and San Diego, California. Extension Training in Costa Mesa, California is now being offered in the Newport Harbor Area.

Registration is now underway and will continue through the month of May. The last day of registration will be June 9, 1961. The office will be open Monday through Friday for registration. There are day and evening classes meeting from 8 a.m. to 12 noon and 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. daily Monday through Thursday.


