Bloodmobile Here Thursday, May 25

There is no blood type so rare that it cannot be found in the extensive past-donor files of the Los Angeles Red Cross Blood Program.

"There are names of close to 2,000,000 donors in the Red Cross cross-filing system," declared Mrs. Robert Orsini, 1519 Beach Ave., blood program chairman for the Torrance branch of Red Cross.

Maintenance of a rare donor file by the newly-established blood research laboratory under Dr. Phillip Sturgeon is one of the newest life-saving activities of Red Cross.

"Medical demands and new uses for blood are increasing right along with the growing population here in Torrance," explained Mrs. Orsini. "That is why we need the all-out support of the community for our May bloodmobile."

The Red Cross bloodmobile will be stationed at the American Legion Hall, 1109 B. Border Ave., on Thursday, May 25.

Persons who wish to donate blood are requested to telephone FA 8-0647 for appointments to visit the mobile between 2:30 and 7 p.m.

Relatives and friends of hospitalized patients who wish to replace blood released through the Red Cross Blood Program are invited to donate blood at the Torrance community mobile.

Members of fraternal, social and church groups who wish to establish or maintain credit in "small group blood accounts" also are urged to take advantage of the mobile's presence in this area.
