

IN THE MATTER OF COUNTY IMPROVEMENT NO. 2142 OF THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF 27TH STREET AND OTHER RIGHTS OF WAY NOTICE INVITING BIDS

Notice is hereby given that the Board of Supervisors hereby invites sealed proposals or bids for the construction of work under County Improvement No. 2142, 27th Street and other rights of way in accordance with the terms and provisions of the Resolution of Intention adopted by the Board on the 8th day of August, 1960, and specifications therefor which are filed in the aforementioned office of said Board.

Said proposals, or bids, will be received by the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, at the Public Contract Room 508 North Main Street, Los Angeles, California, until 9:00 a.m. on Friday, the 26th day of May, 1961, and will be opened, examined and declared by the County Engineer in 9:15 a.m., on the same day in the County Engineer Hearing Room, Room 100 in said Los Angeles County Engineering Building.

The proceedings for the aforesaid improvement are under and in accordance with an Act of the Legislature of the State of California known and designated as Division 7 of the Streets and Highways Code (Improvement Act of 1911), and the bonds to be issued to pay the costs and expenses thereof as provided in said Resolution of Intention will also be issued in accordance with the provisions of said act.

Proposals must be submitted on the blank forms prepared and furnished for the purpose, which may be obtained at Room 130, Los Angeles County Road Department Building, 1540 Henry Street, Los Angeles 25, California; at which office bidders may also obtain copies of the plans and specifications for the contemplated work, and a copy of the Resolution of Intention and the specifications, however, will not be refunded, and the plans and specifications so obtained need not be returned.

Each submitted proposal must be accompanied by a check certified by a responsible bank, payable to the County of Los Angeles, in a sum equivalent to at least ten (10) per cent of the total aggregate amount of the bid, as a guarantee that the bidder, if his proposal be accepted, will enter into and execute the award contract and furnish the required bonds in connection therewith, in accordance with the terms of the aforementioned specifications. In the event that a bond is submitted, it shall be signed by the bidder and a duly authorized acceptable surety acceptable to the Board of Supervisors.

PREVAILING WAGE SCALE

Pursuant to the provisions of the Labor Code of the State of California, the Board of Supervisors has ascertained the prevailing rate of per diem wages in dollars, based on a working day of eight hours, for each craft or type of workman or mechanic needed to execute the proposed contract under these specifications; and it will be required that not less than said rates be paid to all such workmen or mechanics employed or engaged upon the work.

The rates of per diem wages for each of the various classifications of work shall be the hereinafter set forth prevailing rates of hourly wages plus the hourly equivalent of any employer payments for health and welfare, pension, vacation and similar purposes multiplied by eight hours per day. It is understood that in the event that workmen are employed less than eight hours per day, the per diem wages shall be deemed to be that fraction of the per diem wages herein established that the number of hours of employment bears to eight hours.

The Contractor shall, as a penalty to the State or political subdivision on whose behalf the contract is made or awarded, forfeit ten dollars for each calendar day, or portion thereof, for each workman paid less than the stipulated prevailing rates for 48 hours per week under the contract by him or by any subcontractor under him, and the body awarding the contract shall cause to be inserted in the contract a stipulation to this effect:

Provided that overtime pay for Saturdays, Sundays and holidays shall apply to those holidays as recognized in the collective bargaining agreements applicable to the particular craft, classification or type of workman employed on the work.

Provided that notwithstanding the general provision contained herein, guards and watchmen shall be paid one and one-half times the prevailing rate for overtime (overtime shall be time worked in excess of eight hours per day or forty hours per week), and the straight prevailing rate for time worked on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays shall not constitute overtime.

APPRENTICES—May be employed in conformity with Section 1777.5 of the California Labor Code.

RIGGERS—Same wage scale as craft to which rigging is incidental.

WELDERS—Same wage scale as craft to which welding is incidental.

FOREMEN—All foremen not herein separately classified shall be paid not less than 25 cents per hour more than the hourly equivalent of the daily rate of the highest classification in which he has supervision in the six Basic Trades.

Torrance Hospital Holds Annual Meet

"Torrance Memorial Hospital obtained marked progress during the past year, and, in keeping with the most modern medical advances, expended a total of \$15,000 in plant improvements and new equipment."

So stated Leonard A. Ensminger, administrator of Torrance Memorial Hospital, in his report to the 36th Annual Meeting of the Torrance Hospital Association, Ensminger reported that through the support of the doctors, patients, and the Association the hospital has been able to maintain its low patient cost.

"This record is brought out in the most recent cost studies presented by Blue Cross," said Ensminger. "This impartial survey listing hospitals only by number and encompassing the entire Southern California area consistently shows that Torrance Memorial Hospital maintains the lowest average cost over all other hospitals."

EXAMPLE

One example cited was the Tonsillectomy and Adenoidectomy study which showed an average per case cost for the Harbor area of \$87.76; Southern California average \$87.55; and Torrance Memorial Hospital cost per case average of \$61.70.

The low cost rate and continual improvements in facilities, medical equipment and patient care is made possible by the non-profit nature of this community sponsored hospital. Any and all profits realized in the operation of the hospital are put back into the hospital to advance its

dedicated purpose of offering the finest in medical care and physical and mental comfort for its patients.

In addition to fulfilling its obligation to the community by keeping costs down, the hospital continues to follow the wishes of its late founder, J. A. E. Sidney Torrance, in supplying free medical care to indigent patients. In the year 1960 discounts and free care service provided by the hospital totalled \$23,460. In all cases in which free medical care is provided by the hospital the doctors of the Medical Staff waive their professional fee.
