Polio Shots Tomorrow at Steele School

Polio vaccine shots at \$1 each will be given in Torrance, tomorrow, from 7-9 p.m. at the Steele School, 19300 Englewood Ave.

Sponsoring the community service event are members of Carle Steele School, Parent-Teacher Association in cooperation with the March of Dimes.

Mrs. M. Jurco, chairman of the project, urged parents to protect children and themselves against paralytic polio before the high incidence season in late summer and early fall.

Last year children under ten years of age accounted for 60 per cent of all paralytic polio cases in Los Angeles County, it was pointed out. Three properly spaced shots are needed for complete protection, with annual booster shots recommended.

Police Dept. Thanks Schools For Cooperation

High Schools Seek Bids on Drive Trainer Units for 'Behind-the-Wheel Programs

Bids will be sought soon on "Drivotrainer" installations for use in behind-the-wheel drive training programs at North and South High Schools, according to Torrance's Assistant Superintendent Albert N. Posner.


Annual savings of about \$10,000 should be possible through use of Drivotrainer units, he said. The unit would include 12 model cars and a

movie projection set-up, both of which would be housed in trailers. Equipment would be used for the first half of the present six-hour behind-the-wheel training, preparing students for actual road experience.

The Board of Education approved the program for North and South High Schools, because sophomore enrollment is large enough to

make the operation more economical. It will not be used at Torrance High next year, because enrollment is only half as large and use would not be economical for the smaller number, Dr. Posner said. All Torrance sophomores take driver education.

Developed by Northrop under sponsorship of the U.S. Air Force Systems Command, the LFC method is designed to increase the performance of large aircraft by de-

creasing friction drag. Compressors mounted in the underwing pods suck air through paper-thin slots in the extra-large wings to prevent turbulence in the boundary layer. This method is expected to increase the range, payload or endurance of large aircraft by 50 per cent or more.

More than 700 persons attended the event, held at the Biltmore Bowl, Los Angeles.


