

Braille Group Presents Fashion Show; Play

A half-hour fashion show, which will be followed by Meyer Hanson's hilarious one-act farce "Remember Your Diaphragm," will be presented in the Recreation Auditorium of Braille Institute, 741 No. Vermont Ave., Los Angeles, on Thursday (June 1) at 8 p.m., according to Fleeta Jagodnigg, director of the Institute's Recreation and Group Work Department. The public is invited, without charge.

This double-header program will serve to illustrate some of the amazing accomplishments of the blind who are participants in the Institute's free rehabilitation, educational, and recreational services.

Hats, dresses, suits, knitwear, and hand-woven stoles will be modeled by 28 members of the millinery, dress-making, weaving and knitting classes. Made during the past season, each article is an example of fine workmanship.

Of special interest are the articles to be worn by Mrs. William Richardson and Mrs. Charles Winn (both sighted) who will model apparel made for them by their blind husbands: Mrs. Richardson, a pink and white woven stole; and Mrs. Winn, a red ribbon-knit dress and white stole.

Broadway actor in 1907 and author who conducts his own weekly radio show, points out that members of the cast had to learn 25 pages of script, assisted by specially transcribed parts done in Braille and tape recording.

Esther Freshman, a volunteer at the Institute, is director of the play. Other volunteers who have assisted are Misses Elsa and Gladys Krafft; Mmes Genevieve Gillette and Barta Gudgeldit.

Rev. Percy Writes From Holy Land

A letter from the Rector, the Reverend Hugh R. Percy, written in Athens, Greece, was read to the congregation last Sunday. Father Percy and Mrs. Percy have been touring the Holy Land and adjacent areas, the trip being a gift from their parishioners on the occasion of Father Percy's 25th Anniversary of his years in the ministry.

Parts of the letter as follows:

"After a very swift flight by jet over the Mediterranean and Aegean Seas, we have come round to Athens, filled with many memories of the Holy Land in Lebanon, Syria, Jordan and Israel. . . In addition to Gethsemane by moonlight we have been profoundly moved by the Sea of Galilee, the simplicity of Bethlehem, the glorious beauty of the whole Palestinian countryside, the quietness of the Jordan River, the unforgettable grandeur of Jerusalem on the four mountains, the coolness of the Pool of Siloam and Mount Nebo, where Moses stood to look out upon the Promised Land — and where the continual mountain breeze is quaintly called 'the Sigh of Moses.' All of these and so many others have convinced us that the Holy Land is far, far more beautiful than we had ever imagined. It is a fascinating panoramas of fertile hills and plains and valleys. Even the desert places are 'blossoming like a rose' in this loveliest season of the year."

Father Percy will go next to London, England, for a short stay, and will return to the Parish on Trinity Sunday, May 28th, on which date a tea will be held in his honor to welcome the travellers back.

Services this Sunday will be conducted by the Rev. Andrew Heederik. Holy Communion will be at 7 a.m. with Choral Eucharist at 9:15 and 11 a.m.

The Reverend Lauren Peifer will celebrate his first solemn mass in his home parish, Queen of the Universe Church in Chicago, Illinois on May 28.


In addition to Brother Peifer, the Court makes many other charitable donations among them are Camp Ter-

Inside Your Home

Your Decorating Problems Answered

Mr. Wallace, I have always wanted a three piece sectional but tell me honestly, how really practical are they? My husband does not like the idea because he can't lay down on it.

I have plenty of room even for two large sofas, but I like the curving lines of a sectional. Can you prescribe a compromise?

Mrs. T., I must certainly agree with you, if you have the room.

A sectional does have graceful lines that really make a room balance out in many ways. As for your husband lying down, it is simple to order a sectional with one end section long enough for him to use as a sofa, still maintaining the graceful lines of the curve.

Mr. Wallace, We have a 13 x 23 ft. living room with a fireplace on the side wall way down at the end of the room. On the other end we have sliding glass doors that lead out on the patio. How would you treat this room, using con-

temporary furniture?

From this incomplete description I can only answer you general about this room. The fireplace sets this room off balance. I think the first thing that I would do is to divide the room, possibly using a pair of chairs or a larger sofa and chair to counter balance the room. You could use a covered bench ottoman to divide the room in the center. Add lamps, some accessories and you're finished.

Mr. Wallace, I have heard it is bad taste to use a lot of pictures on one wall over a sofa. Would you please comment on this?

Actually it is not a general thing that is done, but that does not make it bad taste to do so. I have many times used as many as a dozen pictures over a sofa. It solved the situation. It is far better to use five small pictures, than one large bad one. Remember, there is no such thing as good and bad taste, only taste!
