Garrett Corp. Marks 25th Year

The Garrett Corporation of Los Angeles this week celebrates its Silver Anniversary after 25 years in business.

Founded on May 21, 1936, with a handful of personnel headed by J. C. Garrett who is still president, the organization today is composed of eight divisions and two subsidiaries, employing 10,000 people in operations which span for the world. Approximately 5,500 are employed in Los Angeles.

Originally formed to provide procurement and engineering services for the embryonic West Coast aircraft industry, the company since then has become the leading developer and manufacturer of environmental control systems for aircraft, missiles and space ships. Practically every American built transport airplane and a preponderance of military planes now carry Garrett pressurization and air conditioning equipment plus numerous other components. The company's sales last year totaled \$223,825,000 compared with \$284,832 the year it started.

Robert Plant Appointed to CHP Academy

Former Torrance resident Robert G. Plant has been appointed to the California Highway Patrol and has been assigned to the Patrol's Academy in Sacramento for 12 weeks of training.

The new traffic officers will receive instruction in more than 50 subjects related to traffic enforcement. Emphasis is placed on the California vehicle code, traffic supervision, accident investigation, first aid, preservation of evidence, court systems and legal procedures, and equipment operation and maintenance. The current class is made up of 60 men from all parts of California.

Plant comes to the Patrol directly from the Armed Forces, where he served 14 years in the Army. He also has a brother on the Patrol, Traffic Officer David Plant, San Leandro.

El Camino Schedules Spring Choir Concert

"A Century in American Song" will be presented by the a capella choir and college folksingers of El Camino College Saturday evening, May 27, at 8:30 p.m. in the Campus Theater.

Under the direction of R. Neil Hill, the choral concert will also feature musical representations from the countries of Bavarian, Israel and Norway.

William Collins, a student teacher working as an assistant to Hill, will conduct the "Te Deum" by Zoltan Kodaly, a sacred choral work sung in the original Latin text by the choir. Kodaly, a Hungarian composer, has created in the "Te Deum" moods of exquisite beauty and achieved fantastic heights in the harmonic and rhythmic structures.

"Psalm 134" by Fissinger opens the program, which is in two portions. "A Century in American Song" is the informal "show" portion and features small ensembles and solos as well as the choir.

Selections include "Comin' Round the Mountain," "Rock-A-My Soul," "Two Brothers," a barbershop medley, "My Buddy," a Charleston Medley with dancers, a "Porgy and Bess" medley, "We Saw the Sea," by Berlin, "Laura," and "When the Lights Go On Again."

Representing the period from 1950 to 1960 is "Love is a Many Splendored Thing," and "Hully Gully," "Exodus," arrangement by Bill Fritz, completes the theme.

The finale is "Hail, Bright Abode," from "Tannhauser," by Richard Wagner.

Accompanying the choir and

ensemble is Mrs. Kay Grant-Ham.

Under Hill's leadership the a cappella choir has toured extensively in northern California and sung many times for schools, service clubs and churches. The choir returned this week from a tour of the San Diego area schools and colleges.

BM High Student Body Election Results Told


Civic-minded students of Bishop Montgomery High School went to their class polls May 1 and 2 to cast their ballots for the ensuing school year. On May 3 the winning candidates were announced at an assembly. The results of an 80% voting participation saw:

1960-61 President, George Cannady install Joe Allen as 1961-62 president; 1960-61 Vice President Kathy Host install Sally Robinson as 1961-62 vice president; 1960-61 Secretary, Frances De Benedictis install Gathy Reed as '61-'62 secretary; 1960-61 Treasurer, Don Whitman install Forrest Wermuth as '61-'62 treasurer.

The installation of officers took place on May 17. Campaign Week, the week prior to elections, acquainted the students with the candidates and the ingenuity of their campaign managers. Eberle Sings in Long Beach

Ray Eberle, like The Modernaires with Paula Kelly and Tex Beneke, who will perform at Long Beach Municipal Auditorium, tonight, is a Glenn Miller orchestra graduate.

Ray was Glenn's top singer in the pre-war days, touring the nation for six years under Miller's baton, playing landmark theatres, leading hotels and dance halls. He also was featured in the two Miller films, "Sun Valley Serenade," and "Orchestra Wives."

World War II sent Eberle, like it did with Beneke and Miller, into the armed forces. After his hitch he started back in show business as a single, having lost none of his popularity or polish.

Among the many songs Ray is noted for are "Serenade in Blue," "Blue Champagne," "Moonlight Cocktails," "Elmer's Tune," and "Stairway to the Stars."
