

Torrance Students Capture Key Posts at ECC Election

After sweeping presidential elections at El Camino College this week, Dan Anderson of Hermosa Beach will serve as president of the Associated Students next semester, Terry Harmon, incumbent vice president announced today.

Run-offs for the office of commissioner of activities between Roger Blewett of Manhattan Beach and John Spilka of Inglewood, and commissioner of rallies between Bill Tughes of Los Angeles and Al Schneider of Hawthorne were staged Friday with announcement of winners slated for the coming week.

In an unprecedented display of campaigning, the campus shook with spirit as three political parties waged war for the much-sought office, bringing out a record number of 627 voters, nearly doubling recent voting records.

VICE-PRESIDENT
Backing-up the new president, Bob Kuehn, Torrance captured the vice presidency with campaign running mates Dave Bean, Redondo Beach; Fred Badalamente, Torrance, and Eddie Wood, Torrance, assuming the offices of commissioner of athletics, freshman president and sophomore president, respectively.

New Associated Women Students president will be Ruby Windham, Hawthorne, and secretary of the organization will be Kathy Mufinch, Inglewood, for the coming semester.

The commissioner of public relations post was copied by John Acord, Torrance. Victories went to un-opposed candidates in elections for the commissioners of assemblies, Maureen Hayes, Hawthorne; finance, Wayne Hren, Manhattan Beach, and publications, Wayne Overbeck, Manhattan Beach.

The sophomore secretary

victory was won by Leilani Ellet, Lawndale, unopposed. Also unopposed was Rel James of Gardena, who won the Association Men Students presidency with the vice presidency going to Robert A. Benson of Hawthorne.

Torrance Plant Receives National Award of Merit

SINCE 1957
A Northrop employee since 1957, Kelber was graduated from the University of Illinois in 1947 with a bachelor of science degree in aeronautical engineering. A year later he received a master of science degree in theoretical and applied mechanics from the same university.


He taught aeronautical engineering while completing his graduate work, then joined Rand Corporation in 1948 as a thermodynamicist and propulsion engineer. In 1955 he was employed at Lockheed Missiles and Space Division as manager of space auxiliary power systems, where he contributed to the early development of the U.S. Air Force's Midas and Samos satellite programs.

ACTIVITIES
Kelber joined Northrop Corporation in 1957 and served four years as senior staff engineer in corporate development planning, reporting to the office of the president. He was responsible for coordinating inter-divisional activities in astronautics and nuclear sciences, and was responsible for the technological aspects of product diversification and planning for corporate financial and capital expenditure support. He is the author of four technical papers on advanced space systems, and is a member of the American Rocket Society, American Astronautical Society, Institute of Aerospace Sciences, American Ordnance Association, and the Association for Applied Solar Energy.

South Bay Young Republicans Condemn "Tractors vs. Freedom"

During their regular monthly meeting May 24, at Smiths Fish Shanty, Bill Wilbur introduced a resolution from the floor condemning the actions of the "Tractors vs. Freedom Committee." This resolution, which was overwhelmingly endorsed by the club, indicates that:

1. President Kennedy initiated the Committee and has requested that any funds contributed to it be declared tax exempt.
2. The Cuban Government is calling the proposed blackmail payments "Indemnity for Invasion Damages."
3. This is a direct contradiction to our allies and neighbors who have been requested to place an embargo on all goods to Cuba.
4. The State Department is deliberately overlooking the Logan Act, which provides that no private citizen may negotiate with foreign governments.
