Localities to Visit Park Observatory During Vacations

Following Friday, June 16, windup presentations of "Collisions in Space," the current spectacular at Griffith Park Observatory's planetarium theater, "Man's Place in the Universe" will begin its six-week run at the municipal scientific center on Saturday, June 17, it was reported yesterday by the Los Angeles City Recreation and Park Department.

Spotlighted during the June 17-July 31 presentations of "Man's Place in the Universe" will be a telescopic view of the Milky Way, stretching from one horizon to the other, according to Dr. Clarence H. Clemenshaw, the Observatory's director, who said that the view is a mosaic of four photographs made with a wide-angle camera at Mount Wilson Observatory.

REMINDER

Southlanders and tourists were reminded by Dr. Clemenshaw that current planetarium fees of 60 cents for adults will be increased effective July 1 to 75 cents for adults, but their will be no change in the 30 cent charge for students under 18 years of age.

The Observatory's summer schedule will go into effect July 1, according to Dr. Clemenshaw, who said planetarium theater shows will be offered at 3, 8, and 9:15 p.m. Monday through Friday, with extra matinees slated at 1:30 and 4:30 p.m. on Saturdays, Sundays, the Fourth of July, and Labor Day.

ARRIVAL OF JUNE

The arrival of June often heralds the arrival of mildew in California gardens. 


