SALK VACCINE

Polio could be virtually eliminated with the currently available Salk vaccine if the population was adequately inoculated, according to four Baylor University researchers whose report appears in a recent issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association. Of 100 confirmed cases of paralytic polio which occurred in Houston in 1958 and 1959 only three occurred in patients who had received three or more of the Salk vaccine shots. The vaccine also protected against aseptic meningitis — a nonparalytic form of polio.

Greco Premieres At Greek Theater
