Glendale Federal Opens at Del Amo

Grand opening ceremonies are being held this week for the Del Amo office of Glendale Federal Savings and Loan Association, located at 3832 Sepulveda Blvd., Torrance.

"No matter what their age, we've got something in our opening ceremonies that

will appeal to everyone," said Charles T. Sederlof, manager of the newly-completed office.

"We think the kiddies, and their parents, will be especially pleased with the plans we've made for the children," Cederlof said. He pointed out that those plans called for free snocones and cotton candy, and free kiddie rides including a train and locomotive, ferris wheel, autos, rocket ships and six live ponies.

The kiddie rides will be operating from 3 p.m. until 8 p.m. and Saturday from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. During those same times a clown will be on hand to entertain with comedy-magic acts.

Cederlof said attractions for adult visitors will include the chance to win a free 15' x 33' heated swimming pool or one of six deluxe barbecue sets being awarded as part of Glendale's "Summertime Living" contest. "And all of our visitors—whether they are customers or not—will receive free party favors and refreshments."

Sports fans will be interested in seeing official model of the Los Angeles Dodgers' new baseball stadium now under construction in Chavez Ravine, Cederlof said. The stadium model will be on display in the Del Amo lobby until next Monday afternoon, the final day of the grand opening celebration.

People who enjoy fine art will have the opportunity to see a selection of 22 paintings from the well-known Newport Harbor High School art collection, the manager said. "For the first time in its re-

markable history, the collection of fine art is being exhibited away from the Newport area and will be on loan to us during the entire month of July," he said.

The newly-completed teal and masonry building was built on a 100' x 380' lot near the southwest corner of Sepulveda and Hawthorne Ave. The building, which is constructed on the rear portion of the lot, has 7,500 square feet of office space. City Police Give Warning to Drivers

Now that vacation has started and summer weather is approaching, statisticians in police departments, insurance companies, and the National Safety Council, etc., will soon start shaking their heads, because all types of accident reports will shortly come pouring in.

Now is the time when "carelessness" may turn out to really be "carelessness."

The do's and don'ts of safety are valuable only when they are applied. The juvenile division of the Torrance Police Department suggests each family develop its own safety program tailored to meet individual needs.

The use of a three step safety plan, and contacting local agencies for specific "problem help" or regular safety suggestions should make this a better summer for all.

Step 1. The home and proximity. Step 2. City wide activity. Step 3. Outside City.

Step 1. Check local police, fire departments, etc.
Step 2. Check with life-guarders, and recreational leaders at the parks, etc., for rules and regulations.

Step 3. Check with forest rangers, local sheriffs, etc., in mountain areas.

Chief Bennett of the Torrance Police Department, reminds all parents, that most children are forgetful and violations of safety rules should not go unnoticed.

Repeated instruction may save your child from harm or tragedy.

In case time is slipping by and you forget to program your family's safety, Lt. Rethwisch, commander of the Torrance Juvenile Division, suggests, "Keep the little ones in your sight vigilantly. The rate of home accidents is still running high."

Motorists, watch out for bike riders. Bike riders watch out for cars.
