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NOTICE INVITING BIDS

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received at the office of the Chief Engineer of the Los Angeles County Flood Control District, Room 105, 2350 Alexander Street, Los Angeles, California (mailing address, Terminal Annex, P.O. Box 2418, Los Angeles 44, California) up to 11:59 a.m. Friday, August 4, 1961, and then will be publicly opened and read in Room 111 at the above address for the CONSTRUCTION OF 1988 STORM DRAINAGE BOND ISSUES, PROJECT NO. 487, EAST TORRANCE, IN THE CITY OF TORRANCE, CALIFORNIA.

The work to be done is covered by each of three proposals:

Bids may be submitted on any or all proposals.

Proposal 1 consists of approximately 1,200 linear feet of main line reinforced concrete open channel, 2,100 linear feet of reinforced concrete box conduit, varying in size from a double barrel box 12'-0" WIDE by 7'-0" HIGH, to a single barrel box 7'-0" WIDE by 7'-0" HIGH, 4,800 linear feet of main line reinforced concrete pipe conduit varying in diameter from 102 inches to 78 inches, 528 linear feet of reinforced concrete connector pipe varying in diameter from 27 inches to 18 inches and appurtenant work consisting of, but not limited to, the construction of special structures, manholes, transition and junction structures, catch basins, local appurtenances and fences.

Proposal 2 is the same as Proposal 1 with the exception of the construction of approximately 2,325 linear feet of 7'-0" WIDE by 8'-0" HIGH reinforced concrete box conduit in lieu of the construction of 102-inch reinforced concrete pipe conduit with appropriate manhole and transition and junction structure changes.

Proposal 3 is the same as Proposal 1 with the exception of the construction of approximately 4,320 linear feet of 7'-0" WIDE by 6'-0" HIGH and 6'-0" HIGH reinforced concrete box conduits in lieu of the construction of box and transition and junction structure changes.

Each bid must be accompanied by a certified or cashier's check or bidder's bond in an amount equal to ten (10) percent of the amount of the bid, payable to Los Angeles County Flood Control District as a guarantee that the bidder will, if awarded the contract, enter into a satisfactory agreement within fifteen (15) days after the date of the award and furnish bond to the amount of at least fifty (50) percent of the amount of the accepted bid for the faithful performance of the work in accordance with the contract and specifications and to guarantee the payment of the materialmen and laborers. Each bid must be made on the proposal blanks prepared by the District and shall contain a check or cashier's check for the amount of the bid and a financial surety company authorized to transact business in this state and whose name is on file with the County Clerk of Los Angeles County and a financial surety company authorized to transact business in this state and whose name is on file with the County Clerk of Los Angeles County.

The right is reserved to reject any or all bids not suited, in the judgment of the Board of Supervisors, to the best interests of the District.

Further information will be furnished and sets consisting of proposal blanks, drawings, and copies of the specifications may be obtained at the office of the Chief Engineer of Los Angeles County Flood Control District, Room 115, 2350 Alexander Street, Los Angeles, California, upon payment as follows:

If drawings and specifications are picked up at the District's office, the purchase price is \$2.00 for each set which must be paid at the time the set is picked up. If drawings and specifications are mailed to the bidder, the purchase price is \$3.00 for each set and the request must be accompanied by a check or money order in full payment for the number of sets desired. A return address must be furnished with such request which the purchaser agrees to be returned to the District for refund.

If drawings and specifications are requested by mail the purchase price is \$3.00 for each set and the request must be accompanied by a check or money order in full payment for the number of sets desired. A return address must be furnished with such request which the purchaser agrees to be returned to the District for refund.

The above prices include sales tax.

PREVAILING WAGE RATES

The Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County Flood Control District has ascertained the rates for the construction of the project, based on a working day of eight hours, for each craft or type of workman or mechanic needed to execute any construction contract which may be awarded by the Los Angeles County Flood Control District, California, as detailed below.

Except as otherwise specifically provided for painter classifications, the rates of per diem wages for each of the various classifications of workers shall be the amount of the prevailing rates of hourly wages plus the hourly equivalent of any employer payments for health and welfare, pension, vacation and similar purposes multiplied by eight. Eight hours shall constitute a work day being understood that in the event that workmen are employed less than eight hours per day, their per diem wages shall be determined to be that fraction of the per diem wages herein established that the number of hours of employment bears to eight hours.

APPRENTICES—May be employed in conformity with Sections 1777.5 and 1777.6 of the California Labor Code.

RIGGERS—Same wage scale as craft to which rigging is incidental.

WELDERS—Same wage scale as craft to which welding is incidental.

FOREMEN—Not less than 25c per hour more than the hourly rate of the highest classification over which he has supervision.

LEADERSHIP—Not less than 25c per hour more than the hourly rate of the highest classification over which he has supervision.

They are Norma Jean Root, 15, of 814 Foughill Ave.; Frances Lawton, 13, 21036 Shearer Ave.; and Kathleen Barry, 13, 16905 S. Crenshaw. Teensters from 13 to 15 years will participate in a program of swimming, nature study, horseback riding, archery, campfire shows and other traditional camping activities, all adapted to the abilities of the individual camper.

FORFEITURE FOR PATING LESS THAN PREVAILING RATE:

The contractor shall forfeit ten dollars for each calendar day, or portion thereof, for each workman paid less than the stipulated prevailing rates for any public work done under the contract by him or by any subcontractor under him. Provided that over time rates, rate of pay for Saturdays, Sundays and holidays shall apply to those holidays as recognized in the collective bargaining agreement applicable to the particular craft, classification or type of workman employed on the project.

Provided that notwithstanding the general provisions contained herein, Guards and Watchmen shall be paid one and one-half times the prevailing rate for overtime (over time shall be in excess of eight hours per day or forty work per week), and the straight prevailing rate for time worked on Saturdays, Sundays, and where such time does not constitute overtime.
