P.O.P. High Diver Raul Garcia Believes Man May Jump—and Survive—Any Distance

High diver Raul Garcia believes there is no limit to the height from which a man can dive into water and live.

And he has spent most of his life proving it.

Garcia is 33. For the past 25 years he has thrilled millions with his daily death-defying fiery dives from the jagged cliffs of Acapulco, Mexico, into the ocean, a feat which has brought him and his fellow divers world wide fame.

Raul has performed before some of the most important people in the world, among them former President Dwight D. Eisenhower and Vice President Richard Nixon when they were in office. Over 50,000 people each month watch Garcia, the dean of the divers, from the vantage point of Acapulco's La Perla nightclub.

At Acapulco, Raul dives 136 feet from the top of the cliffs. Elsewhere, he has gone higher and would go higher still, if authorities would per-

mit it.

135' RECORD
In 1958, he dove from four different bridges in the United States, among them the 155 feet high bridge at Huntington, West Virginia. No man has equaled that distance, but Garcia says he can do better.

"I wanted to dive from the Golden Gate at San Francisco, but the authorities turned me down. They said they believed I could do it okay, but they didn't want to encourage others to try it and end up killing themselves," says Raul.

The Golden Gate Bridge is 225 feet above the ocean. Currently, Garcia and two of his fellow Acapulco Cliff Divers are appearing for a limited time only at Pacific Ocean Park.

At P.O.P. they dive from a specially constructed tower, 110 feet over the Sea Circus pool. But Garcia isn't satisfied.

"I want to go higher." And P.O.P. officials have decided

he should have his way.

UP TO 135'
As Garcia becomes accustomed to the 110 feet height, the tower will be raised to 136 feet, the limit of which engineers will allow the tower to be built.

This is the first California appearance for Garcia and his two fellow divers, Alphonso Apac and Manuel Garcia. They were originally signed for only a five-day engagement at P.O.P., but by popular demand are being held over.

The chief danger Garcia must counter with on all of his dives is the wind.

"It can cause me to land in the water wrong," warns Garcia, "causing severe water burps, possible neck or back injuries or even death."

"Make a friend of the wind," says Garcia, "as an enemy it can throw you off balance and kill you. The wind is my friend and so I can and will dive from any height."

Top Volleyball Teams Will Compete for Title in Sixth Annual Tourney Aug. 19

Approximately 25 top-notch California beach volleyball teams are expected to compete in the Beach Volleyball Tournament Aug. 19 and 20 in conjunction with the Sixth International Paddleboard Race Festival in Manhattan Beach, according to William Allds, tournament chairman.

The tournament, officially known in volleyball circles as the Fourth Annual Southern

California Municipal Athletic Federation Beach Volleyball Championships, will begin at 10 a.m. on the north side of Manhattan Beach State Pier August 19 and will end Sunday night with conclusion of finals play-offs, Allds said.

Six sand courts will be set out and equipment will be supplied by the Manhattan Beach Recreation Department under supervision of John F. Shaw, city recrea-

tion superintendent.

ELIMINATED

Mixed doubles and singles will be eliminated this year, Allds said, in order to give more tournament time to men "double A" and "single A" competition, and women's "double A" competitions. Approximately 15 men's teams and 10 women's teams are expected to compete.

Allds expects to see approximately 300 volleyball contestants on the beach during the two-day tournament, which allows for the usual beach-style 6-man volleyball team plus about four substitute players for each squad.

Preliminary games will be concluded Aug. 19, with semifinals scheduled for 10 a.m. Aug. 20, and finals a few hours later at 2:30 p.m.

The Beach Volleyball Championship has emerged as a major event in Manhattan Beach's International Paddleboard Race Festival, which features a 32-mile paddleboard race from the isthmus of Catalina Island to Manhattan Beach State Pier, Aug. 20. The festival is sponsored by the County of Los Angeles, the City of Manhattan Beach and the International Paddleboard Association, Inc.

International Flavor in Aug. 18-20 Swimming Meet

The National AAU Men's Outdoor Swimming Championships at Los Angeles Swim Stadium Aug. 18-19-20 took on more international flavor today with entries from top stars of Brazil, Argentina and Mexico.

Meet director John C. Fellows announced that sprint swimmer Manuel Dos Santos will represent Brazil, butterfly ace Luis A. Nicolao Argentina and three divers, headed by Olympian Alvaro Gaxiola, are coming from Mexico.

Both Dos Santos and Nicolao defeated American champions in the recent meet at Japan, and are flying to Los Angeles with Japan's team of 14, led by free style wonder Tsuyoshi Yamanaka. The group arrives in Los Angeles Monday, Aug. 13.

UPSET

Dos Santos scored a sensational upset in Tokyo in the 100 meters over Steve Clark, teenage wonder of the Santa Clara Swim Club, national

AAU indoor 100-yard champ at 46.8 and holder of the American 100-meter record of 54.7.

Nicolao outstroked Mike Troy of the Indianapolis A.C. Olympic and world record holder, in the 100-meter butterfly.

The Mexican divers are being brought to the meet by Javier Ostos, president of Mexico's swimming federation.

Diving competition will be held at the Los Coyotes Country Club with the champs appearing in exhibitions at the Swim Stadium throughout the three day meet.

Swimming finals will start each day at 4 p.m. with morning heats at 10 a.m.

Tickets for the three days priced at \$5 are obtainable at the Swim Stadium, adjacent to the Coliseum, at AAU meet headquarters, 330 W. Avenue 26, Los Angeles 31, and at swim clubs throughout Southern California. Individual tickets for each day are also on sale.
