

Grid Season Opens Aug. 31 For Harbor JC Hopefuls

Harbor College grid hopefuls will be issued equipment on Thursday, August 31, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., and will begin drilling for the 1961 season on Friday, September 1, according to Selwyn W. Yancy, director of athletics at the college.

All prospective Seahawk players have been urged to arrive for processing on Thursday in order to receive equipment and lockers, fill out necessary forms, undergo physical examinations, and be ready to report to Head Coach Joe Berry for the first practice of the season on Friday, September 1. Berry and his assistants, Floyd Rhea and Norm Jacot, will conduct practice sessions daily, Monday through Friday, until the fall semester is underway on September 11.

The Harbor Seahawks, members of the powerful Metropolitan Conference, open their 1961 season at home on Friday, September 22, when they tangle with San Bernardino College in a non-conference game. After another non-conference game at Citrus on Saturday, September 30, Harbor opens its conference season against the potent Santa Monica Corsairs at Harbor on Friday night, October 6. Remaining games will find the Seahawks playing East Los Angeles College at East L.A. on October 13, Bakersfield College at Harbor on October 20, Long Beach on October 27, Valley College at Harbor on November 3, El Camino in a day game at El Camino Stadium on November 11, and San Diego in San Diego on November 18.

Motorcycle riders who have been campaigning in the mid-west for the past week will be back Friday night at Ascot Park to give scorching Neil Keen some heated competition in the expert class 15-lap main event.

Racing starts at 8:30 o'clock, one-lap qualifying at 7. Returning this week are Stu Morley of Los Angeles, No. 2 rider back of Keen for the 1961 Ascot championship, Johnny Gibson of Duarte, Don Hawley of Inglewood and Troy Lee of Pico-Riviera. Gibson and Hawley are the real old pros of the two-wheeler game on the Pacific Coast and both are in their 14th consecutive year of competition. Gibson finished fourth back of Keen in the national 8-mile finals at Ascot Park July 22, the second western rider to receive the checkered flag.

Morley is defending Pacific Coast half-mile champion and has been a consistent point winner all season on the Ascot track at 183rd and Vermont.

Early Deer Season Off to Good Start

Despite hot and humid weather, the early deer season got off to a normal start last weekend in Santa Barbara, Ventura and Orange counties, with hunter success reported good in most areas. The season will continue in these three Southern California counties plus portions of Los Angeles, San Bernardino, Riverside and San Diego counties through Sept. 24.

Department of Fish and Game wardens reported that hunter conduct was very good on the opening weekend. Despite the high fire hazard, there were no hunter-caused fires. Few citations were issued for violation of hunting regulations.

Two shooting accidents were reported, both involving self-inflicted wounds. An Escondido youth shot himself in the ankle with a .22 revolver while trying to kill a rattlesnake, and a man practicing quick draws the night before the season opened succeeded in outdrawing himself and was taken to a Newhall hospital for treatment of a bad gunshot wound.
