Annual Charity Classic Kicks Off September 16

A pair of small college powerhouses clash Saturday night, Sept. 16, in the Second Annual White Cane Bowl Football Classic at East Los Angeles Junior College Stadium.

The "Broncos" of Cal Poly (Pomona) will be shooting for their eighth straight win, carried over from the 1960 season, against the Los Angeles State College "Diablos," in a grid tussle sponsored by District 4-L, Lions International, as part of its famed White Cane "aid to the blind" program.

Proceeds from the game will go towards benefitting the blind through a multitude of activities, including eye examinations, eye glasses, medical and surgical care, free tuition in Braille, the purchase of white canes and other assistances to the blind.

Coach Don Warhurst's Cal Poly squad topped Whittier, 33-14, in last year's White Cane Bowl game, played before a capacity crowd at Mount San Antonio College stadium.

29 Wins
Warhurst, in four seasons at Cal Poly, racked up one of the top small college coaching records, with 29 wins, 7 losses and 3 ties.

The brawny L.A. State Collegians, piloted by head coach Leonard "Bud" Adams, and led by co-captains Roy Easley and Harold Grey should prove a strong threat to Cal Poly's winning streak.

Joe Womack, sensational 200-pound running back, who made Little All-America last year, will be back, and the team has been augmented by a number of talented transfers, according to Coach Adams.

The Lions International hope to make the White Cane Bowl game an annual fixture on the local sports scene, similar in importance to the annual Shrine game.

Uncrowned Champ Signs in For Riverside Grand Prix



Stirling Moss of London, uncrowned champion of the world's racing drivers, yesterday became the first official entry for the fourth annual Grand Prix for Sports Cars, the \$20,000-added classic to be run at Riverside International Raceway Sunday, Oct. 15.

Grand Prix director Glenn Davis, who announced the entry of Moss, also disclosed a streamlined schedule of events. Four days of activity at the 3.25 mile hill and dale course will be launched Thursday, Oct. 12, and hum toward a dramatic climax in the 200-mile Grand Prix to headline the top international figures of road racing.

The name of Moss, of course, is magnetic. The hard-driving Briton, who has never won the world title because he refuses to join a racing team, but unofficially wears the crown by authority of his rival drivers, will tackle the tricky Riverside course in his own Lotus Monte Carlo. This marks his third appearance in the race.

Record Season

The effervescent Britisher, who scored a smashing Formula I triumph over the same course last winter in the U.S. Grand Prix, has had another remarkable season. He christened the European Grand Prix circuit with an unprecedented third Monte Carlo victory, and last month waxed the Ferrari team with his Lotus in the German Grand Prix at Nurburg Ring.

A busy season for Moss, the

1961 campaign also has seen him gather checkered flags in formula car races at Silverstone and Brands Hatch, England.

His most recent important triumphs came a week ago at Copenhagen where he won the Danish Grand Prix in a Lotus and two weeks ago at Goodwood where he piloted a Ferrari Grand Turismo to a sports car victory.

The Lotus he'll handle at Riverside is the identical car he drove here last year, then followed up a week later by blowing off the international field at Laguna Seca.

The Riverside classic, sponsored for charity by a Los Angeles newspaper, has become one of America's top auto classics with total attendance in three events of some 230,000.
