Attending flag-raising ceremonies, Aug. 19, at the end of four months winter darkness at McMurdo Sound, Antarctica, was Donald L. Archibald, storekeeper second class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Archibald of 5356 Doris way, Torrance.

Members of Antarctic Support Activities and Detachment "A" of Air Development Squadron Six took part in the ceremonies during a full minute of day light at the "bottom of the world."

Temperature at McMurdo was minus 10 degrees, unusually warm this early in the season, and winds were recorded at more than 40 m.p.h., during the sun's first appearance since April 23.

Men of the wintering-over party now are busy preparing for the mid-September arrival of the first aircraft from the outside world since April.

Lawrence A. Gipson, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Gentry of 1533 W. 205th St., Torrance, completed recruit training, Aug. 11, at the Naval Training Center, San Diego.

Military ceremonies marked the end of nine weeks of "boot camp" and included a full dress parade and review before high ranking officials and civilian dignitaries.

In nine weeks of instruction, the "raw recruit" is developed into a Navy Bluejacket, ready for duty with the fleet.

Participating in a large "fleet sail" aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Ranger for a cruise to the Western Pacific, are Warren R. Heaton, fire control technician third class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. George L. Heaton of 1816 Calamar, and Lon R. Baker, seaman apprentice, USN, son of Mrs. Blanch K. Weber of 165 W. 223rd St., both of Torrance.

The fleet sail, largest scheduled by the Navy in four years, will involve approximately 20 ships, including one other aircraft carrier, two heavy cruisers, and three destroyer divisions.

During the operation, the ships will be under the command of Vice Admiral Charles L. Melson, commander of the First Fleet, who

will fly his flag from the heavy cruiser USS Helena.

Most of the ships involved are normal rotational reliefs for ships now serving with the Seventh Fleet in the Western Pacific.

Undergoing plebe summer training with midshipmen in the class of 1965 at the Naval Academy, Annapolis, Md., is Midshipman William R. Akin, son of Mr. and Mrs. William L. Akin of 19524 S. Flavian Ave., Torrance.

The class, which was sworn in June 28, is receiving the training in preparation for entering the academy's Brigade of Midshipmen in the fall.

The two-month military indoctrination includes marching, correct wearing of the Navy uniform, Navy terminology and some academic work.

Midshipmen undergo four years training at the academy, including three summer training cruises. Their curriculum, consisting of 160 semester hours leads to a Bachelor of Science degree.

Upon graduation from Annapolis, middies receive a commission of ensign in the Navy or second lieutenant in the Marine Corps, Army or Air Force.

Earl St., Torrance, completed individual combat training, Aug. 18, with the Second Infantry Training Regiment at the Marine Corps Base, Camp Pendleton.

Four weeks of combat training are given to every new marine upon completion of recruit training. They receive instruction in the latest in patrolling, first aid, military explosives, defensive positions and advanced schooling of weapons firing.


