
**MEETING DATES — FINAL CLASSES**

**Warriors Promise Another Exceptional Grid Season**

El Camino College lost its sensational passing combina-tion of quarterback Ron Veres and end Paul Burseson, but the Warriors could have another fine year if a similar TD duo coach Norm Verry imported from Serra High School clicks, using the slot-T.

Veres, who pitched for 1833 yards, and Burseson, both first team All-Metropolitan Conference selections last sea-son, have transferred to Ore-gon. Now Verry is grooming quarterback John Torok and his Serra teammate end Curt Altenberg to fill their shoes. Altenberg was Catholic League Player of the Year as a senior last year and was a first team all-CIF flankman. Torok is a pinpoint passer.

**PROBLEM**  
Quarterbacking poses the main problem for Verry. He greeted 86 candidates the first day of practice and has eight lettermen and 12 squadmen returning off last year's team which beat everyone on its schedule except Bakersfield, Santa Monica and Long Beach. Vying with Torok for QB duties are two promising returning squadmen, Pat Cro-zier and Roger Riley.

El Camino's interior line should be stronger with center Bob Goss, a '60 starter, back along with another starter, tackle Bruce Bero. New faces include guards Jim West (Hawthorne) and Royal Lord (Inglewood) and centers Ron Spencer (Inglewood) and Jim James (Aviation). The Warriors lost another All-Metro end, 2nd team in Jim Hester, who was forced to terminate his career due to a head injury. But all-Pioneer League end Mike Andrews of South Torrance may take up the slack along with Tom Blanch, who lettered two years ago.
