## 23 Pro-Basketball Games Televised Over NBC Beginning This Saturday

Twenty-three professional basketball games will be televised nationally by NBC-TV Network on Saturday afternoons during the 1961-62 season starting this Saturday, according to the schedule of TV contests announced by Maurice Podoloff, president of the National Basketball Association, and Tom S. Gallery, NBC Sports Director.

Gallery also announced that sportscaster Bud Palmer would be the court-side commentator for the basketball games. Palmer was an All-American basketball player at Princeton and starred in pro ranks with the New York Knickerbockers.

This will be the eighth straight year that NBC-TV is televising pro basketball. The 23-game TV slate includes 18 regular-season contests, four playoff tilts and a pre-season exhibition this Saturday.

In the opener, the St. Louis Hawks, champions of the Western Division of the NBA last year, play the Cincinnati Royals, led by last season's "Rookie of the Year," Oscar "Big O" Robertson, at Cincinnati Gardens.

The first regular-season game to be televised will have the Philadelphia Warriors, with Wilt "The Stilt" Chamberlain, playing host to the New York Knickerbockers Oct. 21, at Convention Hall.

The weekly basketball series will skip three Saturdays during the season — Dec. 16, Dec. 30 and Jan. 6 — when NBC-TV will televise football games. TV time for almost all of the games will be 10:30 or 11:30 a.m. PT, 1:30 p.m. CT).

The NBA launches its 16th year of operation with one new team, the Chicago Packers and Detroit, each will have three home games televised during the season. Boston, Chicago, Cincinnati, New York and Syracuse each will be seen twice on TV on their home courts, with Los Angeles and St. Louis appearing once at home.

It is difficult to imagine that a writer, obsessed with themes of violence and death on the battlefield and in the bullring, could have grown up in a small, quiet Midwestern town, but such is the story of "Ernest Hemingway" as outlined by Dr. Kennett Moritz in KNXT's early-morning classroom series, Monday Wednesday, and Friday, (6:30 to 7 a.m.) on Channel 2.

Dr. Moritz' lectures for the week will cover Hemingway's "Early Years" in Oak Park, Ill., his spirit on the football field and in the classroom, and his "Later Years" as a newspaperman, foreign correspondent and ambulance driver during World War I. As a boy Hemingway was torn between two outside interests — fishing and hunting with his father or learning the cello according to his mother's wishes. He chose the former which led to many exciting adventures all over the world.

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
