### First Aid Talks Continue South Bay Hospital Series

A second lecture series on "Immediate Care of the Sick and Injured," for persons who need advanced first-aid information in their occupational lives, begins this week at South Bay Hospital, it was announced by a hospital spokesman.

Dr. Arnold C. Niemeyer, former South Bay Hospital chief of staff who initiated the lecture series last year, said the lecture committee has invited local fire departments, police departments, ambulance services, and the lifeguard service, to attend the 16 lectures, which will be given at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday in South Bay Hospital's staff cafeteria. Lectures will be repeated the next night.

Niemeyer also said lecture invitations have been dispatched to safety teams of local industrial concerns, such

as Shell Oil, Union Carbide and AirResearch. Interest in the lecture program, resulting from the first series last year, has come from communities of Downey and El Cajon, Dr. Niemeyer said.

Lectures will be given by South Bay Hospital staff doctors and Don J. Haley, chairman of safety services of South Bay Branch of American Red Cross. Nature of the lecture material and programming presumes students have completed previous Red Cross first aid courses.

Subjects will be shock, bleeding chest emergency, pediatrics emergency, orthopedic emergency, head, neck and back injury; burns, childbirth, psychiatric emergency, irradiation, electrocution, cardiac emergency, and transportation of injured persons.

Doctors in charge of the series are Drs. John N. Steward and Ronald T. Piccirillo. Giving lectures will be Drs. Robert C. Schaeffer, Robert A. Schmit, Richard J. Lescoe, Kenneth Z. Zike, James F. Robinson, John C. Todt, John L. Bourne, John E. Gunning, Robert A. Richards and Joseph E. Scallon.

The lecture program is under auspices of the South Bay Hospital emergency room committee, the emergency and disaster committee of Southwest District of Los Angeles County Medical Association, and the training division of Area G Medical Service of Civil Defense.

### Local Firm Concludes Research

An important technical break-through in the field of fluid flow measurement using radioisotopes was announced this week by Corwin D. Denney, president of Automation Industries, Inc., Torrance.

Culminating a nine months company funded research program, Automation has perfected a unique new flow measurement method several times more accurate than anything now commercially available, Denney said.

Although these new methods using radioisotopes were developed primarily for use in petroleum refining, it is anticipated that they will find application in such diversified fields as hydroelectric installations, cross-country pipelines and chemical process control systems.

A new Automation division—Isotech—has been formed operating under patent license agreement with California Research Corporation, a subsidiary of Standard Oil of California, to offer fluid measurement services to the oil, gas, and chemical process industries.


