Anywhere you wander, anywhere you roam, you'll rarely find a collection of international atmosphere to rival the fourth annual International Family Festival this weekend at Aviation High School.

The two-day festival will include exhibits from around the world, strolling minstrels, programs of international song and dance, food from various countries and many, many other cultural events from far-away lands.

The festival will open Saturday noon and close Sunday night. An international buffet will be served Saturday from 4:30 to 7 p.m. with a choice of Hungarian or Polynesian delicacies. Tickets for buffet at \$1.25 are available at chamber of commerce offices in Torrance, Hermosa and Redondo Beach and San Pedro.

Art Displays

A wide variety of works of art from Africa, Austria, Britain, France, Greece, India, Israel, Italy, Mexico, Morocco, Norway, the Netherlands, Poland and Sweden will be shown.

This exhibit will be open from noon to 8:30 p.m. Saturday and from 1 to 6 p.m. Sunday.
