


Local Elevens Win 2, Drop 1 Friday

Friday night North High fumbled leaving the field open for South's Phil Fish to scamper 14 yards for a TD.

Spotting the Monarchs three touchdowns in the first quarter, the Saxons scored a late second quarter touchdown on a nine yard quarterback sneak by Jeff Bell.

After losing all previous contests between the two schools, a determined Saxon team gave its rosters something to cheer about in the second half.

Although the Monarchs scored the first time they had their hands on the ball on a 48 yard lateral-pass play, the Saxon defense gave Morningside no rest.

On the Monarchs' initial play of the second half, Saxon right tackle Bob Martin broke through the Morningside line and threw QB Bob Lofgren for a nine yard loss.

On the next play Morningside dropped back to punt, but a bad return from center enabled Ed Estrade to nail the kicker for a safety.

THS WINS

In another upset, the Torrance High eleven tromped Aviation's Falcons Friday night in a grueling contest which left the Tartars on top, 26-13.

Fighting for a place in the Pioneer League, Torrance opened the game with a 65 yard runback of Aviation's kickoff by Damon Wisham. Allan Billings followed through with the touchdown.

Only other highlight of the first quarter was a 60 yard gain by Bob Clark on a pass from John Cambon.

Tie didn't last long for, with one minute left in the quarter, Hewell Robinson plunged 35 yards to bring Torrance back into the lead.

Only loss chalked up to local high schools Friday went to South High which lost by a narrow 14-12 margin to the Redondo Sea Hawks.

World's Cycle Champs Compete at Nov. Meet

Southern California, and the Pacific Coast will host its first international motorcycle road races over the weekend of November 4 and 5, at Rosamond International Motorcycle Raceway in the Antelope Valley, it was announced today.

George French, West Coast executive director for the United States Motorcycle Club announced the plans for the gigantic racing weekend over the two and one-half mile paved racing course.

Three major events will highlight the two days of racing. A 125 kilometer event for motorcycles up to 125 cc's (7 1/2 cubic inches) will open the days racing. It will be followed by a 150 kilometer affair, presented for 250 cc. racers (15 cubic inches). The crowning event of the day on Sunday will be the 200 kilometer dash for the 500 cc. (130 1/2 cubic inch) streamliners.

French has completed

negotiations with recently crowned world 250 c.c. class motorcycle champion, Mike Hailwood, of Oxford, England, to be on hand to compete and defend his title.

Hailwood set the racing world on its ear in June when he became the first triple winner in the famed Isle of Man T.T. races held on the small island in the Irish Sea, between England and Ireland. He captured the 125 cc., 250 cc. and the senior 500 cc. events and was leading the 350 cc. event until the final 37 3/4 mile lap when his machine dropped out with mechanical trouble.

His was the first triple win in the 54-year history of the event, the World Series of motorcycle racing. Hailwood will ride the famous Honda four cylinder racers in the lightweight races, and then switch to either the Italian M.V. Augusta or a British, Norton Manx for the 500 c.c. championship race.

Mighty Midgets Blast Off Oct. 28 In Five-Race Event at Gardena

1961 United Racing Assn. point leader Russ Maynagh of Huntington Beach tops a glossy field of mighty midget pilots Saturday night, Oct. 28, at Ascot Park, 183rd and Vermont in Gardena, as the roaring Fords and Offies stage a five - race, 50-lap speedfest under the arcs, starting at 8:30 p.m.

Time trials kick off the action at 7 p.m.

Moynagh, driving his own potent red No. 49 Offy formerly owned by Indianapolis great Ray Crawford, already has racked up four main events this season and will be after his second straight Ascot win.

Then there are such returnees from the big sprint car circuit, one-armed Allen Heath of Northridge (four big car wins at Ascot) and the on-charging Phoenix duo of Gene Brown and Phil Bradley. Brown, sixth in URA standings, won four main events at Riverside before taking over a sprint car mount. Bradley in his

chopped Chevy V4 was consistently blowing off the mighty Offies until he blew his engine in a recent Ascot race.
