Museum Shows French Prints By Rouault

Prints by the 20th century French master Georges Rouault from the collection of Mr. and Mrs. Harold P. Ullman of Los Angeles will be shown for the first time at the Los Angeles County Museum beginning today.

The exhibition was previewed Tuesday evening, at a Museum Association reception.

It will continue through Dec. 17.

According to Ebrja Feinblatt, curator of prints and drawings, about 200 works will be shown, representing a period of almost a quarter of a century.

A prolific artist, Rouault (1871-1958) is best known to the public through his paintings of circus subjects and religious works.

Many of his prints were created as illustrations for books and all of his important series will be represented in the exhibition, ranging from the "Miserere" to his circus series.

Miss Feinblatt stated that this will be one of the rare occasions when the bulk of Rouault's graphic work will be shown. He worked as an illustrator of five books published by the celebrated Amboise Vollard for almost 25 years, creating prints which rank with the greatest graphic expression of our time.

A catalog will accompany the exhibition, which also includes prints from the Brooklyn Museum, Museum of Modern Art, New York, and the Mr. and Mrs. Fred Grunwald Collection.
