

### Governor Appoints Debs, Yorty As Hosts for White House Meeting

Gov. Edmund G. Brown announced appointment of Supervisor Ernest E. Debs and Mayor Samuel W. Yorty as heads of the host committee of the Los Angeles

Regional White House Conference to be held at the Ambassador Hotel on Nov. 20 and 21.

Ten White House conferences are scheduled during the month of November. Two will be held in California.

The San Francisco conference, also scheduled for Nov. 20 and 21, will cover the same domestic issues and use many of the same government experts as the Los Angeles meetings.

### ANNEXATION TO COUNTY LIGHTING MAINTENANCE DISTRICT NO. 1676

Beginning at the intersection of the center line of Carson Street, 50 feet wide, as shown on map of Tract 3612 recorded in Book 46, pages 6 and 6 of Maps, in the office of the Recorder of the County of Los Angeles with a line that is parallel with and 175 feet easterly measured at right angles, from the center line of Moneta Avenue (formerly Figueroa Street), 50 feet wide as shown on said map; thence southerly along said parallel line to the northerly line of Lot 7 of Tract No. 23979 as shown on map recorded in Book 625, pages 8, 9 and 10 of said Maps; thence westerly in a direct line to the northerly corner of Lot 6 of said last mentioned tract; thence southerly in a direct line through the southeasterly corner of Lot 1 of said last mentioned tract to the center line of 21st Street and having a maximum depth of 210 feet from the Figueroa Street frontage (all measurements being approximate); and such other changes of zone which the Commission may recommend in the interests of public health, safety, and general welfare within the area bounded as follows: On the north by the centerline of West 21st Street; on the east by the centerline of South Figueroa Street; on the south by the centerline of West 21st Street, and on the west by the east boundary of the Harbor Freeway excluding therefrom any property presently zoned C-4.

### Seliga Talks To Knights Of Columbus

Emil Seliga, executive vice president of Great Western Savings and Loan Association, spoke recently to the Knights of Columbus of Los Angeles on "Two Blueprints for Prosperity."

Seliga compared Pope John XXIII's encyclical, "Christianity and Social Progress," dealing with social progress and problems, with the Commission on Money and Credit study on U.S. monetary, fiscal and credit policies.

According to Seliga, "The interesting thing about these two blueprints—prepared as they were by men far from one another—was the fact that they contained many of the same conclusions."

### REACHING GOALS

"Both studies," Seliga reported, "stressed that the individual human being is important, is entitled to live in a society in which he can reasonably expect to reach his personal goals, and is not only entitled to a minimum decent living standard but protection from those elements in our society which prevent us from securing our needs and over which the individual has no control."

"They also concluded that government must not inject itself into the lives of indi-
