

Santa Claus Lane Features Stars, "Sweetest Garden" Candy Float

Uniqueness is the keyword of "Parade of Stars" that opens Santa Claus Lane in Hollywood Nov. 22.

The conventional float is replaced with features that are peculiar to the entertainment industry, when things like the chuck wagon from "Rawhide" and the wise men with their camels appear from "King of Kings."

Another float will be made of candy. It will be called "Sweetest Garden."

A myriad variety of flowers, all made from candy such as mints, marshmallows, wafers and cinnamon will comprise the float.

The bouquets are designed to resemble well known flowers, with each individual piece of candy begin encased in plastic and fastened to a common bloom in a realistic pattern.

Perhaps the most extraordinary problem of Parade of Stars is the problem of limiting the number of entertainment personalities who can appear.

The guest list contains a well rounded group of personalities — children, ingenues, leading ladies, romantic male stars, character actors — from television and motion pictures.

The total participants in this category will be trimmed.

Students Must Get Polio Shots

Evidence of immunization against poliomyelitis will be required of all students enrolling at El Camino College for the summer session of 1962 and all semesters thereafter, college officials announced this week.

This action follows the passage of State Assembly Bill No. 1940, which states in part that "No minor or adult shall be admitted to any private or public elementary or secondary school as a pupil unless such person . . . has been immunized against polio."

Students are advised to have written records of evidence prepared in advance of registration so that their enrollments may not be delayed, Merl F. Sloan, director of student personnel, suggested.

State requirements are that the record be written and include the name, date of immunization, type of vaccine and name of agency or physician administering the vaccine.

In the event that such written records cannot be obtained, parents or guardians of minor pupils, or an adult for himself, may affirm in writing that such immunization has been performed.

Persons who have received their immunization prior to Jan. 1, 1962, may, by giving the approximate dates of administration to school authorities, satisfy the law.

If immunization is contrary to belief, that seeking admission to the college may file a statement with the governing board of the school requesting exemption for the reasons stated.

The same holds true with the physically handicapped for whom immunization may not be considered safe.

"Immunizing agent," as specified by the law, means any currently approved commercially produced vaccine licensed by the Division of Biologic Standards, United States Public Health Service.

For Salk-type vaccines, immunization shall consist of a total of three inoculations at any interval except that the interval between the first and the second and between the second and third inoculations shall not be less than two weeks.
