Physicist Serves As ECC Visiting Lecturer Dec. 11

Dr. Leonard O. Olsen, a member of the physics department of the U. S. Naval Postgraduate School, Monterey, and a past president of the American Association of Physics Teachers, will serve as a visiting lecturer at El Camino College, Monday and Tuesday Dec. 11 and 12.

He will visit under the auspices of the American Association of Physics Teachers and the American Institute of Physics as part of a broad, nationwide program to stimulate interest in physics.

The program is now in its fifth year and is supported by the National Science Foundation.

The American Association of Physics Teachers is one of the five member societies of the American Institute of Physics.

Other member societies are: American Physical Society, Optical Society of America, Acoustical Society of America, and the Society of Rheology.

Lectures, informal discussion, assistance to faculty members concerning curriculum and research problems in physics, and talks with students will feature Dr. Olsen's visit.

Arrangements for his visit are being made by William T. Mooney Jr., assistant director of instruction, Division of Physical Sciences at El Camino.

Dr. Olsen served for many years as professor of physics at Case Institute of Technology and is the author of a textbook on experimental physics.
