

### Youth in "Critical" Condition, Stabbed by Unknown Assailant

A 16-year old Lawndale youth is fighting for his life today after being stabbed several times in the chest and slashed across the face in a knife fight last week.

Police are searching for the assailants of the youth, Dr. William A. Taylor, president of the local district who is listed in critical condition by Harbor General physicians.

Officers were notified when the victim, Billy Lawrence, 4754 W. 163rd St. was brought to an emergency medical clinic at 2114 Redondo Beach Blvd.

Youngster was apparently stabbed in a knife fight that took place near Normandie and 190th St. Because of his condition he was unable to give details of the fight to the investigators.

Harbor Division of the L. A. City Police Department is conducting the investigation.
