
Don Gish and Steve Sands direct the plays.

Ryan Completes Flex Wing Vehicle For Army Transportation Research

The first two phases of flight testing of Ryan's Flex Wing powered test vehicle, which has won international attention, have been successfully completed for the Army Transportation Research Command at Brown Field, Otay Mesa.

The unusual aircraft with the flexible wing was shipped to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's facility at Langley Field, Va., Nov. 16 in a C-130 Hercules transport plane.

At Langley, it will undergo tests in the full-scale wind tunnel before NASA pilots take over for continuation of flight tests.

A Ryan crew, which will include Lou Everett, the project engineer who made approximately 200 flights in the Flex Wing at Brown Field, will support the NASA program at Langley Field.

FLIGHT TESTING

Voluminous engineering and performance data was obtained in the many hours of flight testing in a San Diego area as this flying test bed demonstrated a

new mobility concept for the Army—a flexible wing which can be packed in a small space and quickly deployed to provide a large aerodynamic surface with high lift properties.

Built by Ryan, Aerospace, San Diego, this manned test vehicle is of interest to the Army for adaptation to such functions as carrying personnel, high priority cargo, litter and other equipment in combat zones.

Army spokesmen pointed out that the Flex Wing principle can be used with manned or pilotless vehicles, and has potential for towing or air-dropping large logistic cargoes for tactical missions.

While NASA extends the testing in an Army-funded program, Ryan engineers in San Diego will continue their intensive study of various other applications of the Flex Wing.

VARIOUS USES

These include its use as a paraglider for recovery of the first stage booster of the Saturn space vehicle in a NASA contract, and as an unmanned towed glider to

multiply the cargo-carrying capacity of Army aircraft.

The latter contract is from the Army Transportation Research Command.
