Inside Your Home

Your Decorating Problems Answered By BEN L. WALLACE, N.S.I.D.

Mr. Wallace: We are about to repaint our living room and I was wondering if it is still proper to paint the ceiling white or should I paint the ceiling the same as the walls?

Mrs. H. Wood, Lomita

Mr. Wallace: There are many schools of thought on this question. Some decorators agree, some disagree, but the general consensus of opinion is that you should merely add approximately four parts of white paint color to your wall paint. This will lighten the ceiling gradually and not too sharply giving a pleasing lift to the ceiling line.

Mr. Wallace: I have heard that it is not good to use a bookcase in the living area. Would you please comment on this?

P. Moore:

Using a bookcase in the living area is in most cases good sound decorating. Books can give a room color and a subtle intelligent look achieved by nothing else. Probably the people telling you this do not have any books to show, so you know how that story goes.

Mr. Wallace: My boy's bedroom is very small yet he needs a place for books, a place to study, and a place to store his clothes and of course a bed. Is there any way that I can coordinate this room?

This is always a problem in a small room, but there is an answer. There are several nice wall units on the market that can be mounted on the wall and can be used for bookcase, desk, and storage. All in one unit these groups take very little space and can be used for both boys and girls rooms.

OPENING NIGHT

A special opening night program at 8 p.m., featuring the United Nations Children's Choir from Long Beach with a selection of Christmas carols will officially open the show.

The Long Beach choir is the creation of Mrs. Easter Beckley, director, and includes 92 children of different nationalities in native costume.

The exhibition and daily programs will be open to the public without charge from 5 to 10 p.m. weekdays, and 1 to 10 p.m., Saturday and Sunday.

Rubber Latex Duplicated by Laboratory

Rubber latex, the milky fluid tapped from trees a remote plantation around the world and imported in liquid form for a wide variety of uses, has been duplicated in the laboratory and the world's first plant for its commercial production is already in operation in Southern California.

This was announced yesterday by J. P. Cuingham, general manager of the Synthetic Rubber Division of Shell Chemical Company.

The successful start-up of the new plant in Torrance was the culmination of a lengthy research and development program involving scientists and engineers at Shell's central research laboratories at Emeryville, as well as at the Southern California headquarters of the Synthetic Rubber Division, Torrance.

The new product, called Shell Isoprene Latex, is chemically similar to Shell Isoprene Rubber, or polyisoprene, which was the world's first commercial duplicate of solid natural rubber when Shell began its manufacture in Torrance in March, 1959.

Present Shell Isoprene Rubber capacity at Torrance is 40,000,000 pounds a year, and Shell has under construction at Marietta, Ohio, a second plant twice as large which will be completed within the next three months.

Shell Isoprene Latex will compete in quality and price with the natural product. It will find application in a wide variety of end-products such as foam rubber cushions, gloves, rug backing and elasticized undergarment and swim wear.
