



TORRANCE BOY SHOT

Wounded in Attempt To Flee Questioning About RB Burglaries

A 16-year old Torrance youth, attempting to flee from police questioning, was shot down Friday morning by a Los Angeles City police officer.

Arnold Boyce Quinn, 5019 Marion St., was halted by a squad car in downtown Los Angeles when he attempted to retrieve articles, alleged to have been stolen, from a pawn shop at 508 South Main St.

First giving his name as Mike Adams and his age as 18, the 6-foot 165-pound youth later broke free from the officers and fled up the street.

Patrolman W. M. Lindsay reported that he pursued the youngster and called several times for him to halt.

When the youth contin-

ued to run Lindsay said that he fired one shot, hitting him in the back. Quinn took two or three more steps and then fell.

The wounded youth was then taken to the prison ward of Los Angeles County Hospital and booked on juvenile burglary charges. His condition is listed by hospital officials as "critical."

STOLEN WATCH

Investigating officers said that the suspect had previously sold a watch at the pawn shop which later proved to have been stolen in a Redondo Beach burglary.

Pawn shop owner Herbert Kohn was asked to call the police if the suspect returned to his store. Friday morning when the youth returned he was re-

cognized by Kohn who then contacted the police.

The boy, who first told police he was from Nevada, wore a 1926 class ring from Santa Cruz High School.

Redondo Beach police, contacted by the Los Angeles department, said that they had several "wants" for the youth. Investigators said that they expected to clear up several unsolved burglaries with the youth's arrest.

Hospital physicians reported that the bullet fired by the officer penetrated the boy's back and ranged through and lodged in the front abdominal wall.

Saying that they had listed his condition as critical they stated that he had about a "50-50" chance of surviving the wound.

MEDICAL IMPERSONATOR ...

District Attorney Will Seek Complaint Against Local Fraudulent Physician

District attorney's deputies Friday announced that they will seek a complaint against the son of a New York practicing physician who attempted to pass himself off as a doctor in this area.

Detectives from the Torrance police station and the Sheriff's office combined forces in a two day search for the culprit, later identified as Mark Robert Yarry, 21, before they found him, near death, in a Torrance apartment building Wednesday.

Yarry was discovered, unconscious from an overdose of nembutal and secenal, by another resident of the apartment building.

Investigating officers alleged that the suspect had applied for a job as physician at a Lawndale medical center, stating that his name was "Dr. John W. Schermer" of New York, and that he was licensed to practice medicine in California, Alabama and New York.

He presented documents to authenticate his statement and was accepted into the firm as a physician by Dr. Robert Beiner, owner of the center.

Mrs. Beiner, wife of the doctor, stated that she had helped "Dr. Schermer" furnish his apartment and had loaned him her automobile.

Dr. Beiner, early last week, became suspicious of his new employee and attempted to check out the documents presented. California certificate and American Medical Association membership, as well as a state-issued narcotics certificate, traced through serial numbers, had been issued, they stated, to other practicing physicians in the state.

At this time Dr. Beiner contacted a New York hospital, where the suspect had said that he had served as resident physician. At the hospital they contacted the "real" Dr. John Schermer who said that he had worked at the hospital for more than ten years. He further report-

ed that he had been held up on August 14, and his wallet containing all of his medical documents, was taken.

Report Pact With Railway for Drain Crossing

County officials announced this week that an agreement has been reached with the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway in the construction of a storm drain project in East Torrance.

Work is now in progress on the drain which was approved by the Board of supervisors last August.

Officials said it is necessary for some work to be done on railway property and it has been recommended by the flood control district that construction of a trestle by the railway would be the most economical plan for the crossing.

"The cost is reasonable and an obligation of the flood control district by reason of the prior rights in the land held by the railway," they said.

Reimbursement of \$11,330 to the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway for the actual cost of constructing the trestle was authorized by the board.

Dr. Beiner then called both Torrance police and the Sheriff's Lennox office and a stakeout was placed on the suspect's apartment. Numerous leads were followed up before discovery of the unconscious suspect.

Yarry was given emergency treatment at Harbor General Hospital and then transferred to the prison ward of the County Hospital.

Father of the suspect, en route from New York, said that Yarry had been "in and out" of mental institutions most of his life.

Investigators said that they believe that he got his medical "know-how" from his close association with his father.

Still unconscious at General Hospital Yarry is unable to answer questions. A felony complaint will be issued against him.

Plans Underway To Halt Erosion At Local Beaches

Expediting of plans and specifications to halt erosion at two local beaches was ordered this week by the board of supervisors.

Action came following a statement from Supervisor Burton W. Chace that buildings and service roads valued at \$100,000 in areas adjoining Torrance beach were being threatened by erosion.

Chace pointed out that local concerns have offered free of charge approximately 100,000 cubic yards of sand. The county, however, will have to excavate, transport and place the sand on the eroded portions of the beaches.

The motion by Chace instructed the county engineer to expedite the preparation of the necessary plans and specifications for the project and that the chief administrative officer make necessary funds available.
