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COUNTY IMPROVEMENT NO. 2126-M

NOTICE INVITING BIDS
Notice is hereby given that the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles hereby invites sealed proposals or bids for the construction of cement concrete curb and gutter, precast pavement on aggregate base and drainage structures in County Improvement No. 2126-M, First Street and other right of way in accordance with the terms and provisions of the plans and specifications for said improvement.

Proposals must be submitted on the forms, prepared and furnished for the purpose, which may be obtained at Room 174 of the Los Angeles County Road Department Building, 1540 Henry Street, Los Angeles 33, California; at which office bids may also be obtained. Plans and specifications for the contemplated improvement may be examined at the County Engineer's Office, 201 East Bonta Avenue, San Dimas, California.

Each submitted proposal must be accompanied by a certified check or by an acceptable bond payable to the order of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles in an amount equivalent to at least ten (10) per cent of the total aggregate amount of the bid, as a guarantee that the bidder will, within fifteen (15) days after written notice that the contract has been awarded to him, enter into and execute the awarded contract, and furnish the required bond in connection therewith, in accordance with the terms of the aforementioned specifications.

PREVAILING WAGE SCALE:
Pursuant to the provisions of the Labor Code of the State of California, the County Board of Supervisors has ascertained the prevailing rate of per diem wages in dollars, based on a working day of eight hours, for each craft or type of work or mechanic needed to execute the proposed contract, and will require that not less than said rates be paid to all such workmen or mechanics employed or engaged on the work.

THE RATES OF PER DIEM WAGES FOR EACH OF THE VARIOUS CLASSIFICATIONS OF WORK SHALL BE THE HEREINAFTER SET FORTH PREVAILING RATES OF HOURLY WAGES PLUS THE HOURLY EQUIVALENT OF ANY EMPLOYER PAYMENTS FOR HEALTH AND WELFARE, PENSION, VACATION AND SIMILAR PURPOSES MULTIPLIED BY EIGHT. EIGHT HOURS SHALL CONSTITUTE A DAY'S WORK; IT BEING UNDERSTOOD THAT IN THE EVENT THAT WORKMEN ARE EMPLOYED LESS THAN EIGHT HOURS PER DAY, THEIR PER DIEM WAGES SHALL BE DETERMINED TO BE THAT FRACTION OF THE PER DIEM WAGES HEREIN ESTABLISHED THAT THE NUMBER OF HOURS OF EMPLOYMENT BEARS TO EIGHT HOURS.

BRICKLAYERS—Same wage scale as craft to which rigging is incidental.
WELDERS—Same wage scale as craft to which welding is incidental.
APRENTICES—May be employed in conformity with Section 1777.5 of the California Labor Code.
