Approval of plans and specifications for the improvement of Hawthorne Ave. between Pacific Coast Hwy. and Newton St. was announced last week by county officials.

Bids for the project will be opened by the Board of Supervisors Jan. 23. Improvements were designed by the Los Angeles County Road Department and the project is scheduled for completion in June, 1962.

Work on this 0.4 mile segment of arterial highway will consist of constructing concrete curb and gutter, pavement, and drainage structures, to provide a six-lane highway between a 100-foot right of way.

"During the progress of work, an unobstructed smooth roadway surface on Hawthorne Ave. consisting of two traffic lanes, one lane in each direction, will be maintained, and access to all adjacent properties will be provided," spokesmen said.

They pointed out that Hawthorne Ave. in this vicinity is in poor condition. Patty McNearney was in charge of planning for the Christmas party while Elizabeth and Glenda Vietty organized the gift collection.
