Skiing Resort Owners Are Own Best Customers

Kratka Ridge, the popular nearby ski area on Angeles Crest Highway, is currently not only enjoying its finest skiing in its ten-year history (30 inches of packed powder), but it also boasts one of the handsomest owners and prettiest co-owners in the business.

The reference is, of course, to husky Randy Zimmer, one of the finest ski racers in the far west, and his blonde wife, Norma, who is probably better known as the "Champagne Lady" singer on the famous Lawrence Welk TV show.

Randy is one of the original ten co-owners of Kratka Ridge and for years has reigned as one of the greatest ski acrobats extant. His wife, whose soprano voice has thrilled millions, has been the "voice" of many nationally-known TV commercials as well as a star of the Welk show, and is an excellent skier in her own right.

Following in their parents' footsteps are the Zimmer boys, Ronnie, 12, and Mark, 9, who have been ski-born since they were able to walk, and who can be seen almost every weekend enjoying Kratka's chair lift and four rope tows.

The Zimmeres are also plenty busy in other channels. Randy, a skilled finish carpenter, is in the midst of building a lavish mobile home manor on a country club deluxe basis in La Habra, while Norma is kept hopping with the Welk show, TV commercials and recordings occupying her "spare time."

Surprise Entry Listed in Today's Ascot Park Tilt

Surprise entrant A. J. Foyt of Houston, the 1961 Indianapolis champion, heads a powerful three-car Bowes Seal Fast entry in J. C. Agajanian's USAC national championship midget auto race this afternoon at Ascot Park, Gardena.

Foyt previously had not been expected in the field, recovering from minor surgery. However, the two-time national driving champion got the go-ahead this week and was planted in one of the Bowes cars by Jack London of Oakland. He'll be favored in the 40-lap main event.

Joining Foyt as teammates will be Elmer George of Indianapolis and southland favorite Billy Cantrell of Anaheim who was slated to drive the No. 5 Offenhauser which Foyt drove to victory in last month's 150-lap Grand Prix.

The three-car team bucks a field deep with Indianapolis contention. The speedway 500 is represented by its last two outstanding rookies — Jim Hurtubise of Lennox (1960) and Parnelli Jones of Torrance (1961)—as well as veterans Shorty Templeman, Dempsey Wilson and Jimmy Davies. The latter is more famous at the moment for his 1960 and '61 national midget driving championships. The former Glendale driver now hails from Monticello, Ind.

NEW THREAT
Hurtubise is expected to unveil a powerful new threat to the long-dominant 110 Offy engine. He has been assigned to pilot a Tempest-propelled car entered by Mickey Thompson. The machine formerly was owned by Porky Rachwitz of Rubidoux. Thompson is confident the new Tempest engine will make it a threat to Foyt and the offy.

Jones, who handles the Agajanian Willard Battery Special on the big car circuit will drive Agge's 98 Jr. Sunday. First midget ever to be sponsored by the popular racing promoter-car owner.

Several nationally as well as locally prominent drivers augment the field, including Tommy Copp, San Francisco; Allen Heath, Northridge; Don Horvath, Riverside; Chuck Hulse, Downey; Don Cameron, Downey; Bud Sterrett, Norwalk; Johnny Moorhouse, Santa Ana; Clay Robbins, No. Hollywood; Don Melton, San Bernardino; Mike McGreevy, Hayward; and Joe Garson, Eagle Rock. Qualifying trials will ignite competition at 1 p.m. First race on the seven-event program will begin at 2:30.

The half-mile dirt track is located at 183rd and Vermont.

Top 15 Golfers Scheduled for Local Appearance

Professional golf's top 15 money winners of 1961, headed by South Africa's Gary Player, spearhead the corps of touring pros and local stars who launch the new year in the 36th annual \$50,000 Los Angeles Open, starting Thursday, Jan. 4, at Rancho.

Qualifying for non-exempted players in the Los Angeles Junior Chamber of Commerce-sponsored classic is set for tomorrow at Riviera, Wilshire, Yorba Linda, Hillcrest, El Caballero and California.

The traditional prelude, Thursday's pro-celebrity tournament, will set the stage for the rich 72-hole event which opens Friday and winds up Monday, Jan. 8, at the West Los Angeles course. Stars of the entertainment world will join with the top pros in the pro-club.

Defending champion is talented Bob Goaly, who used last year's victory as a springboard to his best season on the PGA tournament trail. He wound up eighth on the money-winning list with \$34,000. He is one of eight former Open winners in the field, including four-time champ Lloyd Mangrum, the squire of Apple Valley.

Player, the Master's champion and first foreigner to lead the dollar parade (\$68,377); Arnold Palmer, the 1960 golfer of the year who stunned the gallery as the favorite last January by taking a "12" on the ninth hole; Bill Casper; Gene Littler, the National Open Champion; Jerry Barber, the PGA titlist and player of the year, share pre-tournament favoritism.

The tournament also will mark the professional debut of young Jack Nicklaus, golf's leading amateur since Palmer and Gene Littler sealed the courses as unpaid talents. The two-time National Amateur king is a great prospect.
