Your Community Is Interested in... You!

The job of women's editor on a community newspaper is a job filled with mixed emotions. It is not the easiest nor is it the most difficult. The work is as varied as the news which it concerns.

Fortunately, the people of Torrance are my job. What they are doing, what they plan to do and what they have recently done. The club events, the weddings, the showers, the engagements . . . the people of Torrance are the important thing.

At times, when copy is scarce, it can be a disillusioning job. Other times it is a hectic scramble trying to find space for all the news which comes in. Everyone—every club, every wedding, every meeting is important.

There is a sadness connected with the Society desk, as well. A bride sends in a wedding form and the editor knows she is looking forward to a complete description of her wedding—one which she can paste in an album or send to distant relatives and friends. Perhaps there are many people in the area who will learn of her marriage for the first time through the write-up in the newspaper.

INCOMPLETE

Yet, the form is incomplete—she has not taken the time to fill it out properly. The editor sighs. She knows that it is up to her to record in black and white the bride's wedding—to record it in such a way that it will be a thing to be cherished and kept.

Without the proper information, the women's editor does the best she can. If there is time and if she can contact someone for more information, perhaps the story will be all that it should be. If not, the little column of print will record whatever was received and the editor hopes the bride will understand.

Wedding forms are not the only things which come to the editor's desk lacking information. Publicity chairmen of local clubs oft' times in their rush to get a release to the paper leave off pertinent information, thereby making their club news inaccurate.

Yes, the job of being women's editor on a community newspaper is a job filled with mixed emotions. It is gratifying or disillusioning—thrilling or touched with a twinge of sadness.

You, the people of Torrance, are my job—your clubs, organizations, churches, social events. I can only write what I know . . . what you send to me. My job as editor will only be as good as the information with which I have to work.
