Inspired after a dramatic 56-64 victory over a pre-season conference favorite, Bakersfield, on Friday, the Tribe cagers appeared a good bet to wind up with the conference crown for the first time in the team's 15-year history.

Keith Erickson plunked in a short jump shot with only 13 seconds remaining to give the Warriors their first win on the Bakersfield courts since 1954. The win broke an eight-year, nine-game losing streak against the battling Gades for EC.

Globetrotters Schedule LA Showing

Basketball's zaniest team — the Harlem Globetrotters will make its annual spring appearance in Los Angeles Feb. 4 to 11 at the Memorial Sports Arena, a two-game exhibition stand against the Washington Generals.

Founder, owner and coach Abe Saperstein will bring the 35th edition of his famed Negro sports troupe, which again features such artistic as well as entertaining stars as Meadowlark Lemon, Tex Harrison and Murphy Shummons.

Both Los Angeles games on the 1962 Trotter tour will be Sunday afternoon contests.

During the team's 34 seasons, it has compiled a record of 7,125 victories against only 309 defeats. Placing the accents on laughs, the Globetrotters have played in 80 different countries, including behind the Iron Curtain.

The Harlem quintet, which attracted the first capacity crowd for a basketball game two years ago at the 14,000-seat Sports Arena, will be accompanied by its full entourage of pregame and half-time entertainers.

Boating Rapidly Becoming SoCal's Number 1 Sport

The mushrooming popularity of boating in Southern California has helped to triple the number of pleasure craft registered in the United States in the postwar years, The Southern California Marine Association said today.

Since 1947, the number of U.S. pleasure craft has increased from 2,440,000 in 1947 to 8,025,000 registered in 1960, the SCMA said.

The SCMA is sponsoring the 1962 Southern California Boat Show Jan. 19 to 28 at Pan-Pacific Auditorium, where 1962 models and accessories will be displayed for the first time on the West Coast.

"Southern California has led the country for the past three years in percentage increase of boat owners," SCMA president, A. Vin Jorgensen.

The rapid increase in public and private marinas in Southern California, and the numerous bodies of boating water within a 350-mile radius, have swelled the number of fraternity recruits.

Marine craft and engines will go on display at the Jan. 19, to 28 Boat Show.
