Warriors Meet Valley, Seahawks to ELA for Top Metro League Tills

The lead in the Metropolitan Conference basketball race will be at stake Friday night when El Camino and Valley tangle at El Camino College. Both were knocked out of the unbeaten class last week but are tied atop the standings with 4-1 marks.

In other Friday games in the tightening conference chase, Bakersfield invades Long Beach, Harbor is at East Los Angeles and Santa Monica travels to San Diego.

The first round comes to a close Saturday night with Bakersfield at East Los Angeles, El Camino at San Diego, Harbor at Valley and Santa Monica at Long Beach. All games start at 8 p.m.

Bakersfield and East Los Angeles made big moves in the race last week by whipping two foes each.

The Renegades, defending champs, unseated previously undefeated Valley, 85-78, Saturday after walloping Harbor, 70-48. East Los Angeles led all the way, last Tuesday in pinning a first loss on El Camino, 87-79.

Meantime, Harbor defeated Santa Monica, 77-63 (Tuesday). El Camino downed Long Beach, 70-65 (Friday). Valley beat San Diego, 72-64 (Friday) and Long Beach edged San Diego, 71-70 (Saturday) in the other conference games.

Last Tuesday the fury of five East Los Angeles players hitting in double figures—Louis Head (15), Kenji Takai (14), Louis Conde (13), Leonard Lerg (13) and Felix Patterson (11)—shrived El Camino's chances. The Warriors got a 21-point effort from Ron Dinnel and 19 more from consistent Danny Karavas. On the same night, Har-

bor's big three of Ed Briscoe, Al Windfeldt and Charles Campbell bombarded Santa Monica's basket for a total of 52 points to pace the victory. Briscoe hit for 21, Windfeldt for 16 and Campbell for 15, but top scorer in the contest was Santa Monica's Gary Adams with 27.

In the remaining Friday contest, El Camino bounced back from its Tuesday loss to nick Long Beach as Karavas ran his conference total to 85 by hitting 15 for the Warriors. Dinnel had 12 and Mike Schrader and Gary Nixt 10 each. For the Vikings, Mike Woodward and Chuck Shane were high with 11 apiece.

Aluminum and Steel Speedster Here for Winternational Drag Races, Feb. 9-11

The Tennessee Bo-Weevil will unleash its full fury on Southern California, Feb. 9, 10 and 11.

No cause for alarm, though—not unless you happen to be among the 500 competitors taking part in the 1962 Winternational Championship drag races at the Los Angeles County Fairgrounds. For this Bo-Weevil is not the cotton-eating kind. Instead, it eats trophies such as they award at drag races. It is made of aluminum and steel and by National Hot Rod Association standards, it is classed as a modified roadster.

One of the most popular and best known cars in drag racing today, the Bo-Weevil is the creation of Ray Godman, 33-year old insurance broker from Memphis, Tenn., who, despite being physically handicapped, built this "bug" from a tubular frame, Model T body and a supercharged Chrysler engine.

TEAMED UP A drawing, good natured fellow who has won the hearts of fellow competitors everywhere, Godman has teamed up with another native of the Volunteer state to form both a popular and winning combination. The second half of the potent team is Harrison Jacobs, a lanky, 25-year old Memphis plumber with a special knack for handling the Bo-Weevil's approximate 600 horsepower.

According to Godman, a completely new Chrysler engine is being installed in the Bo-Weevil for the Big Go West, and the car itself has been revamped for the fierce competition anticipated in Class A for modified roadsters. The Bo-Weevil has a fine reputation to uphold, having captured a class victory in five out of eight national meets. Best speed to date turned in by the machine is 171 mph in the elapsed time of 9.31 seconds through the standing quarter mile.

The Winternationals will be held at the Los Angeles County Fairgrounds which are located approximately 30 miles east of L.A. downtown area, in the city of Pomona. More than 500 cars and drivers, representing more than 43 states will be competing for class and eliminator honors. Sponsored by the NHRA, the event ranks as one of the most important meets in drag racing, with a spectator attendance in excess of 50,000. A total of 61 classes, ranging from 1000-horsepower dragsters to competition coupes, altered sedans, sports cars and showroom-fresh production models will provide the action.
