### Flight Training Course Available To All Interested Men of Torrance

The Army's Airborne training, which began at Ft. Benning, Ga., more than 20 years ago, has returned to the post.

According to Sgt. Elgin C. Elliott, of the Army recruiting office, 1319 1/2 Sartori Ave., Torrance, the Airborne-Air-Mobility Department of the Infantry School has assumed responsibility for training all U.S. Airborne soldiers.

Each training course will consist of four weeks of instruction and exercises for officers and non-commissioned officers and three weeks for all other men.

The present Airborne instruction is designed to train 250 men in one group. Eventually it will be expanded

until 2,000 men can be trained each month.

In the first week of training, the ground training fundamentals of parachuting, how to jump from a plane and land safely. In the second week, the tower training phase, the students are taught how to control their parachutes during descent from 250-foot towers.

At the end of the ground and tower training, students who have mastered the basic jump techniques and who can meet the physical training requirements progress to the testing week of the basic Airborne course.

During the final week the students must make five qualifying jumps which become progressively more

difficult. The first two jumps are individual tap-outs. The last three are mass exits.

On their final jumps the students carry equipment normally used in combat. This equipment may weigh as much as 100 pounds. All the jumps are from 1,250 feet.

"The Army is always looking for that individual with that 'something extra' that qualifies him for Airborne training," said Sgt. Elliott. "I invite any young man who feels he might be interested in learning more about this challenging field to visit me at 1319 1/2 Sartori Ave., Torrance or call me at FA 8-7069 so we can get together and he can get all the facts."

### Engine Now Being Developed at Torrance Plant

Vickers Incorporated, a division of Sperry Rand Corporation, has placed an order with American Orbitronics Corp. for several components made of precious materials to be used in a new hydrox (hydrogen-oxygen) internal combustion engine. This engine is being developed at the Torrance, California facility of Vickers for Aeronautical Systems Division, Air Force Systems command, USAF.

American Orbitronics will supply valves, valve seats, retainers, keepers, and injector valves for the new engine. Materials such as 10 per cent rhodium, 702 incoltel, rene' 41, and sapphire have been selected for these components because of their resistance to corrosion, electricity, and chemicals, as well as their ability to withstand extreme heat.
