### Dotson Retires After Thirty-four Years With U. S. Steel Division

Harlow P. Dotson, assistant general superintendent of the Torrance Works of U. S. Steel's Columbia-Geneva Division since 1942, will retire Feb. 1, 1962, it was announced today.

The veteran steel executive joined the Torrance Works in 1928 as an electrical leader. From 1929 to 1938 he was chief electrician and from 1938 to 1942 was assistant works engineer.

Born at Clear Lake, Wash., Dec. 21, 1901, he attended elementary and high school at Santa Cruz, Calif., before enrolling at the Extension Division of the University of California where he

majoring in electrical engineering.

Before joining the Torrance works, he was associated with Pacific Coast Steel Company and Western Pipe & Steel Company, both of South San Francisco.

Mr. Dotson and his wife, Lucille, who live at 23701 Western Ave., Torrance, will be honored by approximately 200 friends and business associates at a testimonial dinner Friday, Feb. 2, at the Palos Verdes Country Club.

Mr. Dotson is a member of the Association of Iron and Steel Engineers.

### Schools Schedule Special Polio Immunization Program for Pupils

A special polio clinic program to help facilitate immunization of thousands of students was completed this week by the Los Angeles City School System.

Superintendent Jack P. Crowther announced permission was given to the Los Angeles County Health Department and the Los Angeles County Medical Association to use school facilities in order to conduct \$1 polio clinics at 43 high schools throughout the district as a public service.

The Los Angeles system already has a concentrated program under way to check more than 675,000 students for polio immunization, in compliance with a new state law affecting all public and private schools.

The new state law makes it mandatory for all minors and adults attending a school for the first time this semester to be immunized against polio prior to admission. Only exceptions are when it is against doctor's orders or parent's or guardian's belief. By September all students, new and old, must meet this requirement.

The superintendent said the clinics were conducted throughout the system on Monday, Tuesday, and today.

All clinics were held from 3 to 6 p.m. in either the cafeteria or multi-purpose room on the campus. Signs were set up on the campus to direct the public to the clinic.

Four-member medical teams supplied by the County Medical Association and the County Health Department conducted the clinics for all elementary, junior high school, senior high school, junior college, and adult students who live in the vicinity of the high school where the polio shots are being offered.

Minors who attended the clinics without their parents carried a written note from their parents with the name of the student, the school he will attend, permission to receive the inoculation, \$1 for the service, and the parent's signature.

Persons receiving immunization will be given verification of having received the shot. This is to be re-

### Accept Streets In Carson Area As County Hwys.

Recent street improvements in the Carson Area, just completed by the Wilco Development Company, have been accepted as County highways by the Board of Supervisors, Supervisor Burton W. Chace announced Friday.

Improvements, serving 308 homesites in the new development on 190th St. east of Avalon Blvd., include the construction of pavement, curb and gutter, drainage structures and sidewalks.

Chace said the improvements, adding 4.4 miles to the County system of maintained highways, were constructed by the developer under the supervision of the Los Angeles County Road Department at an approximate cost of \$397,400.
